The funeral took place on Friday last at 2 p.m. from the home to the Church of Scotland Cemetery at Cape Traverse, Rev. Ewen MacDougall officiating and was very largely attended.

Alberton District suffered the loss recently of another aged and respected citizen in the passing on May 7th, of Mr. Andrew Arthur, in the eighty second year of his age. Mr. Arthur was born at Hazel Grove, P. E. I., March 25th, 1837. He removed to Alberton fifty years ago and had resided on his farm, about three miles west of town ever since. He was married fifty five years ago, to Miss Euphemia McDonald, who survives him. He was for sixty three years a member of the Orange Lodge. The funeral service took place at his late residence on May 10th. It was very largely attended and was conducted by his pastor, Rev. A. S. Weil, of Alberton United Church, assisted by Rev. Mr. Elliott of Elmdale and Rev. Mr. Stavert of Hunter River, who gave a very helpful address. Interment took place in Hillcrest Cemetery, Alberton. Mr. Arthur left to

mourn their loss besides his widow, a family of two sons and six daughters. One son, James resides in Massachusetts; another, Stanley, resides at Alberton. The daughters are, Mrs. O. H. Low, Ida, Ruby and Lillian all in Massachusetts; Mrs. Stewart of Brookfield, P. E. I., Edith in New York and Jean of Irvington, Mass., who is at present at Alberton, having come home to attend her father during his illness. Mr. Arthur was a man of quiet retiring disposition, but upright, a good neighbour and highly esteemed in his community. The bereaved wife and family have sincere sympathy of many friends.

"Accidental death," was the verdict rendered by the jury empaneled at the death of William Praught, aged 22 years, of Souris, who was killed at Harmony Junction on Thursday morning last. He with his brother left Souris by the train leaving at 7:50 for Harmony where they were engaged to unload a car of lumber for H. H. Acorn, of Souris. Arriving at Harmony they alighted and as the train moved out they again boarded the train, standing on the steps between the first and second class coaches in order to ride to the siding 300 or 400 feet down the track.
