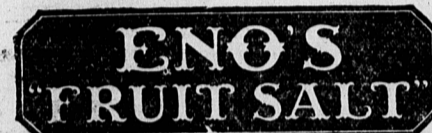

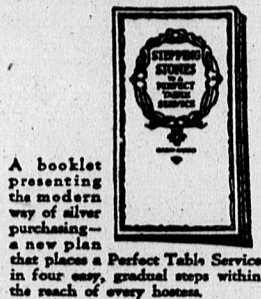

WANT LICENSES TO BUILD DAMS

(Canadian Press) WASHINGTON, May 20—Application for the right to construct a power project to supply Maine, Northern Massachusetts and the province of New Brunswick by a series of dams in Passamaquoddy and Cobscook Bays was made to the Federal Power Commission today by Dexter P. Cooper, Inc., of Eastport, Maine. License was asked for a series of dams connecting the mainland with islands across the mouth of Passamaquoddy Bay to impound the tidal waters within the bay for a series of dams and a power house with Passamaquoddy and Cobscook Bay and a series of dams across the south of Cobscook Bay to exclude tidal waters from the bay. The plans include suitable gates for the passage of tidal and tidal-race waters and two navigation locks, one from the sea level into Passamaquoddy Bay and one from the sea level into Cobscook Bay. The proposed initial installation is 464,000 horsepower and ultimate installation 1,087,000 horse power. Dexter P. Cooper was given a three year permit in the project in May 1926.

MONTREAL, May 21 — There were 95 cattle, 1940 calves, 42 sheep and 2790 hogs for sale on the two markets, including 1200 hogs held over from yesterday. Cattle were steady. Calves were in good demand and prices ranged from \$7 to \$9.50 with the bulk of sales between \$8.50, and \$9. There were not enough sheep and lambs on sale to cause any changes in prices. On one market where less than 250 hogs were offered, sales were made in small lots to butchers, at \$14 to 14.25. On the other market with over 2,000 hogs offered buyers were not bidding and sales were at a standstill.

FIRE LOSS RECORD

Fire losses in Canada during the week ended May 15, 1929, are estimated by The Montey Times at \$589,200, as compared with \$607,100 for the previous week, and with \$360,800 for the corresponding week of last year. From January 1, 1928, to May 15, 1929, fire losses were \$7,467,600, and from January 1, 1929, to May 15, they were \$9,110,200.

The Agricultural Fair at Vevey Rum-Runners Get Blame for Looting Fishermen's Nets

On the shores of Lake Geneva, in Switzerland, lies the old town of Vevey, which Julius Caesar knew as "Vibiscum an important place at the junction of the great highways running north, south and west into the far-reaching Roman Empire. After the fall of Rome and the influx of the barbarians, Vevey lay in ruins, but by the tenth century it had again become a thriving city inside high ramparts.

"About once in each generation," says Hilegarde Hawthorne, writing of a recent visit to Vevey in "St. Nicholas Magazine," "Vevey holds the most wonderful agricultural fete in the world, which is also the oldest—having had the same form since 1680. The last fair was held in August, 1927. It cost more than \$250,000, to produce, over 2,000 people took part in it, and it was seen by more than 150,000.

"One great idea inspires the Vevey Fair and that is that agriculture is the most ancient, the most useful and the noblest labor of man. The people who act in it are the farmers themselves, the tillers of the soil, the breeders of animals, the woodsmen, the goatherds and shepherds with their families. Old and young take part—the old as they have since they were children, the young as they will till the day of their death. "The great horseshoe-shaped stadium is made to represent the ancient ramparts, and before the performance twenty-two cannon shots are fired; one for each of the Swiss cantons. The fair opens with a great parade and once under way it is divided into four parts—winter, spring, summer and autumn. Each of the seasons is carefully and inclusively portrayed by the players, and in the songs and dances, and in every detail of the pageant neither effort of money is spared to give color and reality to scenes representing spring and summer, winter and fall. "This Vevey Fair is a unique and inspiring tradition and through its influence upon the minds and hearts of the people no Swiss can ever think of farming as poor or despicable, or something to look down upon. Far from it the splendid pageant of agricultural existence, and he believes it to be the most completely beautiful of human efforts."—Daily Times, Montreal.

Stock Market News

The local market was again featureless on Monday with trading extremely light. The flurry in the "paper" stocks which started on Friday was not maintained, although these stocks held steady on Saturday. The announcement of a dividend of 2% in stock instead of a cash disbursement of 75 cents on Lyall did not meet with favor and the stock reacted on the news.

Big Missouri surprised the street by soaring to an extreme top of \$18.80 and finishing only a cent above that mark. No news came out to account for the sudden flurry and the movement was generally ascribed to pool operations. Other Pacific coast issues did not fare so well, although Galconda was 5c higher at \$1.70 and Kootenay, Florence made a gain of a cent to 15c.

After wiring on Thursday that International Nickel had another strike of precious metals on the Froid, New York said yesterday that what it meant was that the street was just beginning to appreciate the real value of the Froid ore. At any rate, they got the stock up to \$53.00, at which point, the cynic observed, they unloaded. As a result, the stock sagged to \$51. Now they are saying that the quarterly report, when it comes, will open coin's eyes. In response, a trader observed yesterday that already he had too many nickel eye-openers from New York.
