This year the interest is just as much alive as ever and once the fields are dry the old familiar sound of "play ball" will be music to the ears of the ball players.

Mr. George, President of the City League Baseball, intends calling the annual meeting as soon after the middle of the month as possible and the Anchors, Hovers and Stars are shaping up for their organization meetings before that date, so that with good weather baseball will get away to an early start than ever before from all appearances the boys are ready to go.

Some of the members of the three clubs have already donned the glove and had some practice and with the boys anxious the matter of getting in some early training should be easy.

The Stars will lose Stan Ryan and will have in line for the team with a lot of new material the following:—W. McCabe, V. McQuaid, S. McCarry, Ed. Lewis, W. Ryan, W. McDonald, J. Martin, J. Bolger, R. McInnis, J. Squarebriggs, Goss and W. Power.

With the above players in action this season some thrilling games will no doubt be played, as each team has sufficient material to put up strong opposition.

The Rovers 1925 champions, although drawing the cellar position last season, were only downed in each game by small margins and are locked upon to give stronger opposition this season.

The Anchors the runners up for honors in 1925 and 1926 always gave good ball to the fans, only falling and falling hard in the final tilt for the 1926 championship with the Stars, from all appearances they have the breaks this season, as they will have the well seasoned slab men and a large field to pick from and from every stand point should have a bang up team to battle out for the City League pennant.

## VICE PRESIDENT OF M. P. B. IS OUSTED BY OFFICIAL BULLETIN

A crisis has been reached in the ranks of the Maritime Province Branch of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada by the action of the executive in cancelling the appointment of H. E. Blakney, of Moncton, as vice-president of the branch. Mr. Blakney was appointed by President S. F. Doyle, following the resignation of W. E. Stirling of St. John. The announcement of Mr. Blakney's forced resignation has been made in an official bulletin issued by the Secretary, L. B. MacMillan of Charlottetown. The action on the part of the executive follows a bitter war waged between them and Mr. Blakney over a period of some months. He had strenuously opposed a number of reinstatements made by the branch and has carried his fight to the Canadian Union appeal to President J. A. McVicar to take action.

Mr. Blakney is being supported by the C. N. R. Recreation Club who, through the president, C. C. Gillespie, of Moncton, has wired Mr. Doyle protesting the action of the executive in dismissing Mr. Blakney.

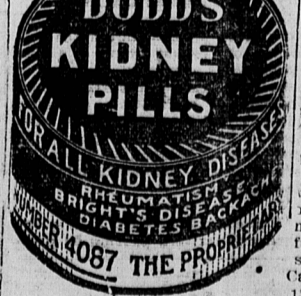

## Boston Bruins Defeats Rangers

NEW YORK, April 5.—The Bruins of Boston tonight defeated the New York Rangers 3 to 1 in the second contest of their two-game series in the National Hockey League semi-finals. The Boston team won the round by the same count, the two teams having battled to a scoreless draw Saturday night in the first game at Boston.

Tonight's victory, besides giving the Bruins titular honors, in the American division of the league also gave them the chance to battle Ottawa Senators in a five game series for the much battered and famous Stanley Cup.

This second period provided both players and fans with the most hectic times of a rugged game. It was marked by four penalties Shore and Abel accounting for action between them. The teams during this stanza were seldom at full strength and short-handedness practically cost the Rangers the game. With the count tied at one all, Herberts having evened matters earlier in the period, Abel and Johnson were penalized from the local defence along with Shore of Boston. The Bruins took advantage of their extra man power, and led by Fredericksen, the big icelander, they crashed the weakened Ranger defence for two goals in quick succession.



## New Organization to Handle Moncton Racing

FREDERICTON, April 5.—The Moncton Driving Club, the new horsemen's organization in Moncton have been awarded the Moncton franchise in the Maine and New Brunswick circuit, officials of the circuit announced here today.

The new club has one hundred members who have provided a foundation fund, and the lease for the Moncton speedway has been awarded the club for a period of years by the Moncton City Council. Early season matinee races will be held on Victoria Day and later there will be a dominion day meet, all leading up to the circuit meeting there in August. For the first time it has been decided to hold the circuit races at Moncton on mid-week dates in an effort to attract all the Maine and New Brunswick circuit stables here. In other years some of the stables have declined to go to Moncton for week-end dates because of the possibility of postponement due to the weather making it impossible to keep engagements for the following week. The dates which have been allotted Moncton, August 3, and 4, will follow the Fredericton meeting and precede the Presque Isle, Maine meeting.

The chief officers of the New Club are present—W. H. Spear and Secretary A. E. Tremblay.

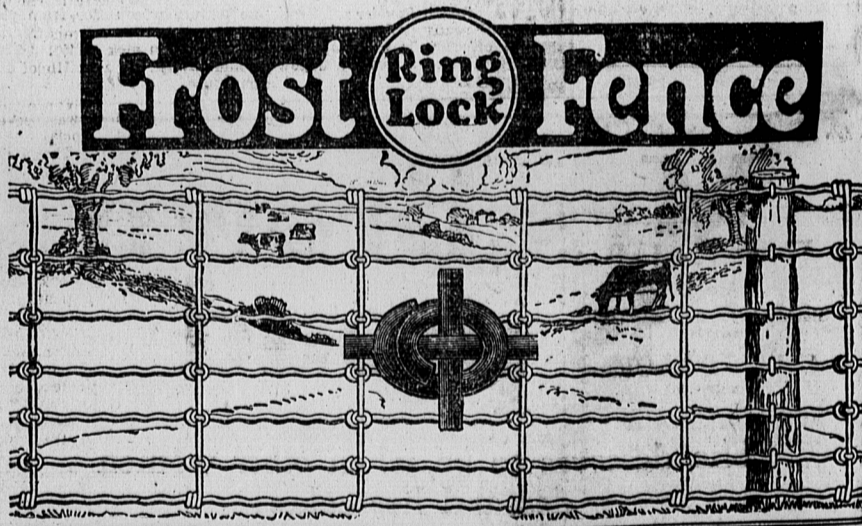
