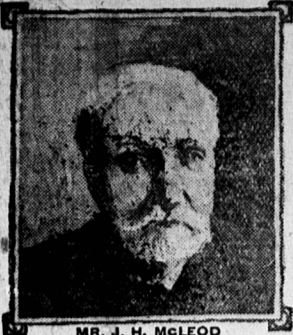

RECEIVES PROMOTION.—Mr. Ernest DeB. LONDON, Feb. 3.—Another blow has fallen upon the arrangements for this year's run of the British Empire Exhibition at Wembley. It is the desire and the intention of the exhibition executive to have the military tattoo early in the season on lines similar to those which were so successful towards the close of last year's exhibition. But it is now believed that this can not be arranged. The military au- thorities object to having the tat- too in May for the reason that it would clash with the Royal Tour nament, which is held annually at Olympia in aid of the navy and military charities, but they would not raise any objection to having it started towards the Autumn at Wembley. The exhibition directors however, want the tattoo early in the run of the show so as to give the stadium program a good send off.

Serious Fire Yesterday P.M.

At 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon the Fire Department was called to the residence of Mr. Walter Carver, 179 Water Street where a fire was discovered in the kitchen. By the time the apparatus arrived on the scene the fire had eaten its way into a space between the walls and the firemen experienced much dif- ficulty in getting it under control. Water and chemical were used and succeeded in extinguishing the blaze. Considerable damage was done by smoke and water and the insurance will not cover the loss. The exact cause of the fire is not known but it is thought that the children were playing with lighted papers, in a closet, which ignited the walls. As soon as the fire was discovered Mrs. Carver, who was ill in bed, was removed to her next door neighbour's.

Despite the heavy snow drifts which piled along the roads the fire trucks made good time getting to the scene of the blaze. On the way back one of the trucks was stalled for a short while but it was cleared and continued to the Sta- tion under its own power.
