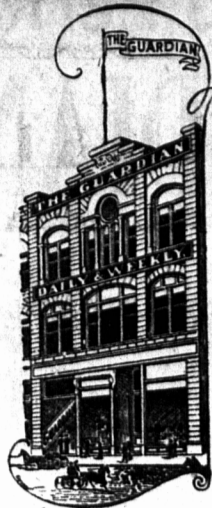

WITHIN OUR RIGHTS.

Says the Moncton Transcript:

Prince Edward Island is slightly inconsistent. It sends an almost solid representation against the Dominion Government and condemned thereby its Grand Trunk Pacific policy. It is now demanding that the Grand Trunk Pacific be extended via the Capes to the Island.

We fail to see where there is any inconsistency in this attitude. The electors of Prince Edward Island did not approve of the Government's Grand Trunk Pacific Railway policy and they so signified their votes. This in no way curtails the rights of this Province in regard to getting connection with the transcontinental road now that it is to be built. Apart altogether from this we claim that the Island has a right to have connection with the railway systems of the mainland by a car ferry at the Capes. The cost would be trivial compared with the needless duplication of the intercolonial between Quebec and Moncton and the car ferry would have the substantial basis of utility and necessity.

We fail to see why Moncton, which enjoys the privilege of railways radiating east, west, north and south should object to the improved connection asked for by P. E. Island. Also we fail to see why the fact of our returning a majority of Opposition members should prevent our receiving a fair share of the expenditure for railways. Ontario also returned an Opposition majority, but the Government is about to build seven or eight hundred miles of the new transcontinental railway through that Province. If the Island is to be punished for expressing its political sentiments let Ontario be treated in the same fashion. Moreover it is simple common sense that the Grand Trunk Pacific should have a terminal port on the Atlantic, which by the present scheme it has not. It would surely be better to end at Charlottetown than at Moncton.

COTTON BURNING IN THE SOUTH.

The cotton planters of the southern states got a fancy price for their cotton in 1903 and in consequence planted a much larger acreage and were rewarded with a record breaking crop in 1904. Fearing a fall in price owing to the superabundant supply, a correspondent of the Charleston News-Courier wrote that journal a letter advising the men of the south to "rise up and burn a million bales of cotton. If that does not remedy the matter," the correspondent continued, "burn another million bales!" Following this a report was sent abroad that the planters were burning their cotton to keep up the price and a good deal of printer's ink was expended in remonstrating or the waste and wickedness of such a course. It now appears that only in one instance, and in that case a single bale of cotton was burned in pursuance of this movement. This was in Clay County, Georgia.

There was really little cause for alarm in regard to the proposal to burn cotton. Of course it would have been an immoral proceeding but quite as foolish as proceeding on the notion was based on the economic fallacy that by destroying a part of the crop the remainder could be made more valuable than the whole. All the political economists from Adam Smith down assert the impossibility of such a result. The civil war once sent the price of cotton up to a dollar a pound, but the conditions then were altogether exceptional. In times of peace speculation has caused more variation in prices than has been brought about by the alteration of good and bad crops. The planters of the southern States have still a practical monopoly of cotton production. This year they have produced some 2,000,000 bales more than the world needs. The price has fallen in accordance with the law of supply and demand. Next year there will be less cotton produced. But there will be no wanton burning of this year's superabundant crop.
