NEW CAR FERRY (Continued from Page 1) In a cool tailored linen suit and wearing a flat-felt hat and black accessories, Mrs. Jones stepped firmly to the special small platform above which towered the green hull of the vessel.

With a smart crack the battle exploded against the steel surface, fanned in a broad white circle and pieces of the shattered bottle clinked in the green water 20 feet below. The crowd of more than 1,000 persons stood at attention, and the band crashed out with "On Canada" and "God Save the King."

As Mrs. Jones stepped back from her place, she was presented with a magnificent bouquet of roses by Miss Adele Chevier, young daughter of the Minister of Transport, and a handsome gold watch on behalf of Marine Industries Limited.

She expressed grateful thanks to Mr. Chevier and Mr. Simard and smiled at Mr. Jones and his daughter, Miss Helen Jones standing a few feet away.

Although Premier Jones had not been advised he would be called upon to make a speech, he responded to Mr. Simard's invitation to do so with easy good-humor.

"It is a very great pleasure for Mrs. Jones and myself to take part in this ceremony," he said. "I wish to say how greatly the people of Prince Edward Island appreciate having a better and a bigger ship than ever before has gone into service on Northumberland Strait."

"When we joined Confederation," Mr. Jones continued, "we did so under an order-in-council of Great Britain which set forth that it would be the responsibility of the Dominion of Canada to provide and maintain marine communication between our Island and the mainland. In the past we have not always felt that this responsibility was honored as set forth in that order."

"Today, as I look at this magnificent vessel, I almost think that the Government of Canada is catching up with that promise made in 1871."

"I am informed that this is the only ship on the seven seas which has two forward as well as having its regular complement of rear propellers. Indeed it is unusual and even I might say unique in many respects. Instead of forcing itself up on the ice as ice-breakers have done in the past, these forward propellers suck the water from the ice in front of the bow thus making the task of breaking the ice much simpler."

"In the thirty years since the transportation system of the Province was placed on a new basis, Prince Edward Island has witnessed great progress. Now with this splendid vessel to carry passengers to our Province and back to the mainland, we can look forward to still greater measure of progress."

A Mainland Ship "Many people I've talked to in the past seem to regard the 'Abegwelt' as a mainland ship. In that I differ with them, it is only an Island ship insofar as it brings the people from the other Provinces and from other countries to visit us in the Island. Otherwise, it is a mainland ship. 'This great new ferry gives us renewed confidence in our future. It is so built as to cope with the heavy ice in the spring. No longer will we feel that at that season we may have to fly or tunnel under the Strait to get to the mainland and back.'"
