Japanese Deserters Lived Like Crusoes

BRISBANE, May 18 — (Reuters) — Two Japanese deserters who had hidden on Manus Island, north of New Guinea, for five years lived like Robinson Crusoe until they were captured by islanders recently. Captain R. C. Clammer, an inspector of the Royal Papuan Constabulary, said during a recent visit to Brisbane, that the two Japanese had deserted from the Japanese army in February 1944, when the Allies landed at Los Negros. The area in which the Japanese lived was taboo to the islanders, whose lore related that at some time in the past a fierce tribal fight had occurred there.

The pair had hunted wild pigs and other game for food. To obtain salt, essential for health in the tropics, they had burnt a species of tree and used the ash. The Japanese had not seen a man for five years.

NORTHOLT, Middlesex, England — (CP) — A greyhound which arrived at Northolt Airport from Dublin was tied up near a parcel which was awaiting Customs clearance. Feeling hungry, he bit a hole in the paper and started to eat the contents — a woolen jumper. The address label was eaten, too.

BERLIN, May 12 — (AP) — Revised figures of the United States Air Force showed tonight 55 Britons, Americans and Germans have been killed in air-lift accidents since the service started last June to counter the Soviet blockade of Western Berlin.

His comment came during preliminary hearing of Dr. Paul Frigon, Montreal dentist, accused of indecent assault of a woman patient, John Crankshaw, K.C., argued that since the judge had decided the case was in camera, newspaper reports of proceedings constituted a breach of the law.

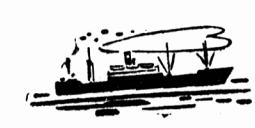
