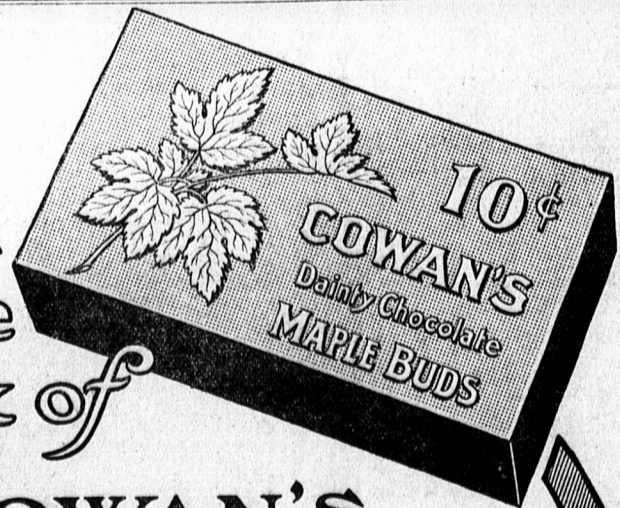

CARLOAD OF FOXES.—A carload of foxes, via the Dominion Express Co., arrived in Moncton on the C.P.R. Saturday afternoon from Edmonton. The foxes are black and patches and mostly for P. E. Island, although a few, it is understood, will be left on the mainland. A cub bear about two weeks old was carried with the valuable cargo. The express age on the shipment amounted to \$800.

AN ISLAND PURCHASE.—Capt. C. Peters, of Sydney has sold his racing mare Helen R. to Capt. D. A. McKinnon of Charlottetown for the large sum of \$1,000. Capt. Peters, who bought her when she was four years old, trained her himself. She made her mark in the Halifax Exhibition races last year when she trotted the mile in 2:19. Under the new rules she is eligible for 2:40 class. On the ice last winter she faced the starter six times and was never beaten once. She raced and scored victories over the best horses in Cape Breton, such as Oak Hall, Ho Gave, Prince Wilkes, Gallagher, 033, Leland F., 2:11, Meadow Vale Billy, Nick R. Woronoka Girl, and Nellie.

Afternoon train will leave Georgetown daily, except Saturday and Sunday, at 1.25 p. m. connecting at Mt. Stewart with Souris train and arriving at Charlottetown at 5.40 p. m. On Saturday only leaves Georgetown at 1.45 p. m. Mt. Stewart 4.10 arriving at Charlottetown at 6.45 p. m. On Saturday only the afternoon train will leave Mt.
