From personal observations and experiences I, myself, could relate many incidents to show how, in our sorrow and desolation of forward, and gave the oil of joy for mourning, and the garment of praise for the spirit of heaviness. Of course, the very symbols, Friendship, Love and Truth impel them to exercise the Christian virtues and graces. **Lenten Pastoral Letter Read In Ireland**

BELFAST, Feb. 7.—Lenten pastoral letters read today by all the Ulster Catholic Bishops were devoted to the serious situation now existing in Ireland. Cardinal Logue, Primate of all Ireland, dealt at a great length with the situation. The Cardinal declared that he never had written under feelings of deeper anxiety or with a more vivid sense of his responsibility in the dark prospects for his country's future. The cry of suffering Ireland, said the Cardinal, "despite efforts to smother it by propaganda, will reach through centuries marking out a sorry place in history for the present rulers. There has been no word of conciliation but repression pure and simple such as has been unknown in Ireland since the days of Cromwell and as such, outstrips any example except that of Turkey and Bolsheviki." The Cardinal protested in equally vigorous terms against the raids on convents and throwing Sisters into confinement. "It must not be inferred that I overlook or condone extremist crimes. Lying in wait and shooting policemen and soldiers is not an act of warfare but is plain murder and will entail punishment for murder here and if not repented and atoned for, terrible punishment hereafter. No reason adduced, not any end, however noble, could justify it."

our hearts that he may enter therein and adorn them with greater and still more precious gifts of His eternal love but our hearts are not inflamed with the answering fire of love for Him. Looking at our lives we do not find therein the manifestation of love towards Him which He has the right to expect from us. Often, indeed, perhaps we recite by word or rote our acts of charity and protest by our lips that we love Him, but where are the thoughts of love, the movement of the affections that should accompany our exterior professions? Did we love God truly, we would delight to think of Him. "All the days of thy life have God in thy mind" (Job IV, 6); we would love to speak of Him and our hearts would be entranced when we hear others referring to Him; but we think of Him but little, if at all, and even then as of some far away being, all-powerful and majestic, but not as one who is the direct and intimate object of our special affections. We speak of Him, but in a listless, careless way that causes no emotion in our hearts or in the hearts of our hearers and we tire most easily of the subject as of something uninteresting to us. Nay more, dearly beloved, we do not love Him, for very often we do not even respect Him. Had we at least respect for Him we would not insult and injure Him. Yet this we do most frequently by our sins, when turning from Him as from an object of little value we give our hearts and minds as well as our words and actions, to the service of some false created good which is placed for the time being above the glory and the beauty of the Omnipotent, above the love and suffering of the Crucified, and in rebellious mood like unto that of Lucifer we repeat to Him whom we should delight to serve in love the Satanic answer, "I will not serve." Or if we abstain from grievous offence and absolute denial of service we lack that earnestness of love that seeks its outlet in laboring for the benefit of the object of the soul's affection. Jacob served his loved her, but how do we labor for the glory of God and for His love "I love you with all my heart" we repeat in our prayers so often, but in our actions we are not moved by love. Some there are and many, who seem to be content to simply avoid offending Him and call this "love." They expect to thus pass through life and as a reward for this so-called "love" to be received into His celestial embrace and showered throughout all eternity with the happiness of His infinite and never-ending joy, but what will they have done to merit so great a reward? "Love begets love" but where there has been no love upon earth is it reasonable to expect that a loveless life can be the seed from which will spring the flower of celestial and eternal love? 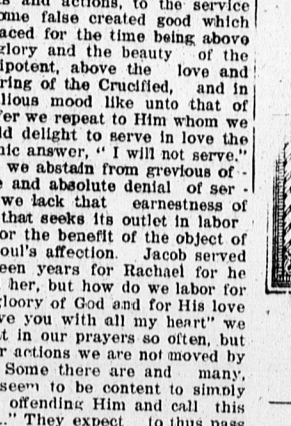
