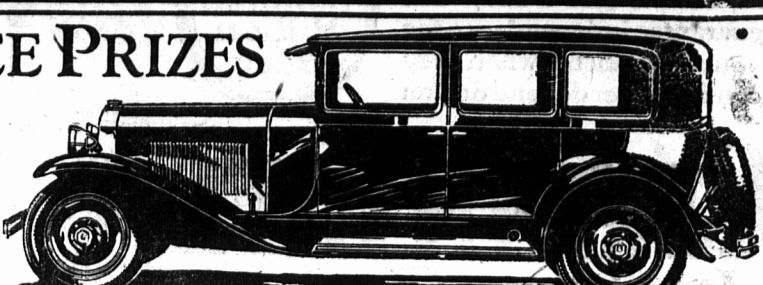

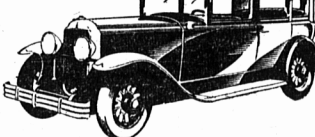
Secure Correct or Nearest Correct Total of Numbers Above to Win La Salle Car
