INCREASE IN DOMINION INCOME TAX RATES—Taxpayers are reminded of the twenty per cent War Tax increase in Dominion Income Tax, rates applicable to the 1939 returns of individuals, as enacted by the Special Session held in September. This means that after calculating the tax at the rates applicable, 20 per cent must be added as War Tax.

Death Of Rev. Father Johnston
The death occurred early Thursday morning at the Sacred Heart Home of Rev. Father John F. Johnston. For some time Father Johnston had been in poor health and in July last he suffered a stroke and since that time had been incapacitated from active work.

The late Father Johnston was born in Charlottetown 74 years ago, a son of the late John Johnston. Upon his ordination in Quebec on May 17th, 1896, he was located in Charlottetown for a number of years.

He was a great and generous friend of the poor and aged and much beloved by them and always seemed to take special delight in serving and ministering to them, and many whom he helped and advised in their tribulations will mourn his great loss.

He was a preacher of exceptional eloquence and ability, and his passing removes one of the outstanding elderly clergymen of the church.

He leaves to mourn three brothers, J. J. Johnston, K. C. Charlottetown; Dr. William Johnston of Dorchester, Mass., and R. E. Johnston, Attorney-at-law, of Boston, Mass.

At the request of the Sisters and inmates of the Sacred Heart Home the remains rested in the Chapel of the Home until Thursday evening when they were conveyed to the home of the deceased's brother, Mr. J. J. Johnston, 140 Rochford Street. Last evening they were conveyed to St. Dunstan's Basilica, where they lay in state and where solemn Requiem High Mass will be celebrated at 10 o'clock this (Saturday) morning after which the funeral will take place in the Roman Catholic Cemetery.

Legislature in Committee
The matter of teachers salaries was aired in the Legislature yesterday in a discussion during the reading of "An Act Respecting Public Schools." The members were agreed that the salaries of school teachers in the Province should be increased.

Daily War Survey

(By The Canadian Press)

Norway's geographic position and mountainous terrain will make for a different type of warfare than any fought in Europe in recent times. It will be open warfare quite different from the fighting on the western front in the first Great War. It will present new problems to commanders and the skilled and daring strategist who can adapt to the local conditions probably will win rich rewards in results.

In the last war the Italian front stretched through a mountainous country but it was a short front. The limited area meant the size of the forces involved resulted in closely held lines.

Heavy fighting on land is likely only if considerable German forces are landed from the south and approach Allied troops land on the west coast and attempt to drive them out.

In that event, however, there may be no settled front. When the naval situation is cleared up it is probable the Allies will have a choice of many points at which to effect landings. They probably will move to attack German garrisons wherever the enemy is established and a reasonable prospect of success is in evidence.

Roads, railways and bridges are infinitely more important to armies in a country like Norway than on the level plains of Northern France and Belgium. And roads, railways and bridges can be destroyed easily.
