### Confederation Bonspiel Will Be Staged Here Week Of February 10th

The Prince Edward Island Curling Association will stage a "Confederation Bonspiel" in Charlottetown the week of February 10-14. It was made known last night.

At a co-ordinating meeting of the various committees held at the Charlottetown Curling Club preliminary plans were laid for the biggest undertaking of its kind ever staged in this Province.

Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell, a trustee of the Macdonald-Brier Trophy, presided at the meeting.

The bonspiel, which will be open to all curlers, is expected to attract entries from all over Canada, parts of the United States and Newfoundland.

Making rapid strides in popularity, the past few years, as one of the leading sports in this Province curling adherents are looking forward to one of the greatest seasons in the history of the game hereabouts.

The ambitious program, as outlined, will call for the use of Forum ice during the week of the curling bonspiel. The ice surface at the Charlottetown Curling Club.

Enthusiasm ran high at last night's meeting and the committees will commence work immediately toward finalizing the arrangements for the mammoth event.

Co-incident with the Confederation Bonspiel will be the determining of the Island rink to represent the Province in the Consols play later in the season.

After letting off steam in their own individual ways, most of the Soxers centered their attention upon Rudy York, who homered them into their first and second World Series wins, and "Boo" Ferriss, who was at his pitching best throughout.

Manager Joe Cronin yelled his thanks and congratulations to the Soxers. "We'll play this series game by game," Cronin replied when well-wishers predicted that his club would win the next two games and wind up the series here.

"That Dickson pitched a swell game," Cronin said. "And what about my Ferriss?"

That was Cronin's reply.

After being clubbed almost raw by his teammates, the balding York was given an opportunity to get in a few words.

"It was a fast ball and I think I hit it as well and as hard as I did in St. Louis. It was a three-and-two pitch and it came over just where I liked them."

### McCloskey Arrives Today For 10-round Scrap With Kid Chocolate Saturday

Shown above is young "Bunny" McCloskey, Charlottetown boy who will be seen in action at the Forum Saturday night when he meets Kid Chocolate, 24-year-old midget slinger from the United States in the feature bout of what promises to be an outstanding boxing card.

Fighting as a welterweight the 19-year-old left handed slugger has piled a lot of action into his ring career, carrying a record of 12 wins and 2 losses, the only one by taking him close to the top of his division. Out of his last 25 fights Sunny has won 24, the only blot on his mark being a knockout at the hands of Joe Pyle.

Since that defeat, a beating that set him back temporarily, Sunny has been aiming at another crack at the dinky midgetling. The night he did fight Pyle and this is not an ally by any means, he was far from his best shape. Sweating 12 pounds in a couple of days would test the stamina of any fighter. That is what he did in order to meet the weight limit set by Pyle, and he was in a weakened condition when he climbed into the ring against the heavy midgetling.

That is all history now as far as Sunny is concerned. Since that time he has been campaigning strictly in the middleweight ranks. He has won five straight battles four of them by knockouts and it appears as if he is definitely back to his real form.

So local midgetling and the majority of them have been pulling for the popular Sunny ever since he attracted attention when campaigning in the States, are again smooth-working Kid Chocolate, according to reports, is a tough fast heavy fighter and McCloskey will be pitted against a real campaigner one who will have to be watched every minute. McCloskey, however, is plenty dangerous himself. He is displaying all kinds of hitting and boxing progress in his preparation for this test, a test that can send him either upwards or downwards on the boxing ladder. His follow-up fight, Sunny will see an upward or downward move depending on the outcome but if he does succeed, courage and gameness will receive them as McCloskey's hand that will be raised in a token of victory on Saturday night next.

McCloskey is expected to arrive in the City today and will have a light workout at the Forum on Friday, the last time he will do his fighting legs until he steps into the ring with the Kid Chocolate.

In the meantime the scene of the fight, the Forum is rapidly assuming the appearance of a boxing garden. The ring is rapidly nearing completion, sound systems are being installed and indications now, so great is the interest being shown, point to the largest crowd in Island fight history being in attendance.

### Dickson Not Warmed Up Enough

BOSTON, Oct. 9 (AP)—"It was a hard speck curve ball it threw to Rudy York," said Murry Dickson, game little 150-pounder, as he came into the St. Louis Cardinal dressing room after losing today's third World Series game 4-0 to the Boston Red Sox.

"But I was far from ready when I took the mound," he added. "There wasn't room enough for me to warm up with the photographers running back and forth in front of the game. I couldn't throw because I was afraid of hitting them."

He will be George Mungler tomorrow, row, feller, shouter, manager Eddie Dyer.

As usual there was a little confusion about the 3 and 2 pitch Dickson threw to York and which the big Indian belted over the top of the left-centre field fence in the first inning to score Johnny Pesky and Ted Williams.

Dyer said Dickson eased up on the pitch. Dickson said he positively didn't. From the press box the ball seemed to be right over the heart of the plate. A walk to York would have filled the bases with two out. Ironically enough, Bobby Doerr, who followed York, fanned on four pitched balls to end the inning.

"Dickson was cold; he wasn't warmed up enough," Dyer said later. "But there's no excuse."

### Bruins To Ice Four Powerful Forward Lines

HERSHEY, Pa., Oct. 9 (CP)—Boston Bruins of the National Hockey League will open the season with four powerful forward lines—each in the pink of condition.

That's how the training camp shapes up today as the Bruins push along in the final weeks of their training grind on Hershey ice. Coach Dit Clapper still is a pretty safe guess that the boys now are showing more stuff than they did at the peak of last season.

The next few days, however, are expected to see some weeding out of excess material and it's a pretty safe guess that the Bruins will not be quite good enough for the big show this season will do Hersey uniforms in the American League.

Topping the four lines for Boston will be the "Kitchen" line of Mike Schmidt, Porky Dumart and Bobby Bauer.

The line of Don Gallinger, Pep Conacher and Joe Carveth seems to have some good hockey tucked under its collective belts. Bill Cowley, Don Grosso and Terry Reardon form another combination good enough to worry any defence. Ken Smith with Herb Cain and Mike Schmidt in another possible combination.

On the defence Clare Martin, a youngster, has been working with Murray Anderson and the veteran Pat Egan and Babe Pratt haven't encountered anything good enough in pre-season scrimmages to give them any gray hairs.

The Bruins will break camp Saturday.

While his hilarious teammates stomped into their dressing room after their 4-0 victory, he sauntered. While they screamed threats that the Cards would have to take two more such drubbings in their own chummy Fenway, Ted said what little he had to say softly.

He had demonstrated that he could punt. In both games in St. Louis and in the third inning today, the Cardinal defence shifted for the night when he came to bat, leaving third base unprotected. But up to now Williams kept swinging away with scant success. But in the third inning, he surprised everyone by dropping the next roller down the third base line for a single.

Among the many things he has been called is "Ted the Kid" and "The Cardinal Hunter." Williams acted like a bashful boy who had accidentally stumbled into a group of over-excited adults.

"Red" Williams agreed, "that punt was nice. You know I once got a hit to left against the Cleveland shift!"

### First Inning Round-Trip With Two On Seals Cardinals Fate

FENWAY PARK, Boston, Oct. 9 (AP)—Again today his Rudy York laid his 216 pounds against a baseball and kept it soaring beyond the fans' vision, and again the pride of Cartersville, Ga., broke the hearts of the hard-fighting St. Louis Cardinals.

Rudy's second mighty four-bagger of the World Series, delivered in the first inning with Johnny Pesky and Ted Williams on base, proved the winning ruse as the Red Sox won today's 4-0 victory for their own Fenway Park and took what looked like a long 2-to-1 game lead in the big play-off.

With big Dave (Boo) Ferriss, Boston righthander, choking the Cards off with six widely spaced hits and not permitting a batter to reach third until the last inning, it was of little or no importance that the American Leaguers shoved another unearned run in the eighth inning off a Cardinal relief fliker.

It was Rudy's clout off right-handed Murry Dickson that did the work. With two out and the count on him three balls and two strikes, the veteran first baseman caught a low pitch on the button and sent it almost on a line over the left field wall. If anything, it was hit with greater force than the one with which he broke up the 10-inning opener at St. Louis three days ago.

In one respect, it was too bad that the Sox got to reliever Ted Wilks for their fourth run in a pair of hits. An error by second baseman Red Schoendienst.

Had the game ended 3-0, York would have gained the distinction of being the second batter on record to have won two World Series battles outright with home runs. Casey Stengel, then with the Giants did it against the Yankees in the 1923 play-off.

Overpowers Cards

York's achievement was only slightly more glittering than that of his husky young teammate, Ferriss. In registering his 14th home run at Fenway Park for the season against no defeats, the sophomore star simply overpowered the Red Birds all the way.

The only time he was even threatened with a score was in the ninth, when, with two down, Stan Musial, Dickson in right field, equal to the bullpen in right fight, down and struck out the dangerous Ferriss. The Cardinals, however, the game and send a crowd of 34,500 home happy. It was only Ferriss' second strikeout of the game, and possibly indicated that he had worked with considerable in reserve.

The game otherwise was notable for the fact that Ted Williams finally laid down a perfect out against the "overbalanced" infield defence with which the Cards had plagued him in the first two games, and that second baseman Bobby Doerr, who had pitched one World Series record by handling eight assists.

Williams, after being jessed purposely in the first inning to get to York—of all people—came up in the third with two away from the plate and a walk, and on the first pitch showed one down the third base line so adeptly that neither pitcher Dickson or shortstop Musial attempted to reach it in time for a play.

### Boston Team Favored To Win Today

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 9 (AP)—Betting odds released after today's game made the Red Sox strong favorites to win the fourth World Series game at Boston tomorrow.

The Sox were prohibitive 2-11 favorites to win the series from the Cardinals, in odds announced by J. J. Carroll, St. Louis betting agent.

Odds on tomorrow's game, with starting pitchers still uncertain, are Red Sox (Hughson) 2-5; Cardinals (Munger) 2-1.

### Gets Big Ovation

Ted, who had made only one hit in nine times up at St. Louis, trotted to the plate in the first inning, ear to ear, and the crowd gave him as big a hand as he ever got for slugging a home run.

Ferriss' shutout, his seventh of the season, was the 50th in World Series history. Harry Brecheen of the Cards rang up no. 49 in blanking the Sox in the second game Monday.

But for that one luckless pitch to York, the 155-pound Dickson was entirely effective against the American League sluggers.

From the first inning through the seventh, only one other Boston player reached third off the right hander, that was Finky Higgins in the second, on a walk, a sacrifice and a passed ball. After that Dickson mowed Joe Cronin's boys down, giving up only Wilks' bunt, a single by Doerr in the fourth, a double by Dom DiMaggio in the fifth, and a futile single by Johnny Pesky in the seventh.

Prior to Musial's triple in the sixth, only two Cards reached second off Ferriss' wide assortment of stuff, and both of them were caught off the bag. Musial walked with two down in the first and swiped second on a poor throw by Hal Wagner, only to be picked off a moment later by Ferriss. Dickson, trying manfully to win his own game, opened the sixth with a line double, but was caught off second after DiMaggio raced in to make a spectacular catch of a short fly by Schoendienst.

Few World Series in modern history straight games such consistently brilliant pitching as has been served up in the two contests at Sportsman's Park and today's spectacle here.
