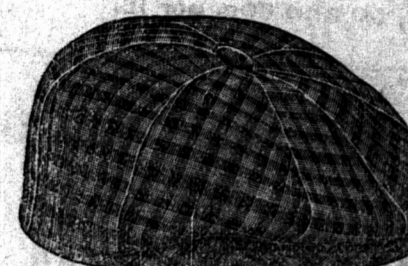
## MUST HAVE IT.

Strong Resolutions Were Passed Elsewhere.

The Government in Duty Bound to Give Prohibition.

At the Methodist preachers meeting in Centenary church, St. John, the following resolution passed unanimously: "This preachers meeting desires to record its great dissatisfaction and disappointment at the decision of the government recently given by the premier not to take any action in regard to prohibition, thereby refusing to give effect to the will of the people as expressed by the recent plebiscite vote. And further, this meeting regards the reasons assigned for non-action as contrary to the promises given to prohibitionists. Copies of the above resolution were ordered to be sent to the representatives and also to the press.

A MAMMOTH Sunday School Convention of all the Sunday School Associations of the United States and Canada will be held in Atlanta, Georgia, April 26-30. It is expected that a delegate will be present from the P. E. Island S. S. Association.

THE Regina Standard of the 23rd says, with reference to its being burnt out by fire, that Editor J. K. McInnis was quickly on the scene and jumped through the front window to the big safe which he endeavored to open to reach the books. Before he could turn all the combinations his clothing was on fire and in compliance with the shouts of friends outside he abandoned the task. The Standard was founded in 1891, as a successor to the Journal, which had been conducted for five years as a Liberal paper and then was sold to a company. Mr. McInnis was then a public school teacher in Wolseley and was a frequent contributor to different papers. The new company engaged him as editor and manager. The new paper started out on broad and independent lines and proved a success from the first issue. In 1892 Mr. McInnis and a Mr. Scott became owners and in 1895 Mr. McInnis became sole owner. The total loss by fire is \$7,900 with insurance of \$4,200. All books were preserved in the safe. Mr. McInnis is a native of North Wiltshire.

A REPRESENTATIVE of the St. John Globe has been informed by Rev. J. A. Gordon that as the letter from the Victoria, B. C. Baptists has not yet arrived he is in almost total darkness as to the desirability of making a change. His work in St. John is in excellent condition, and the reverend gentleman stated directly that the good of his church there would be his first consideration in the matter. The only thing that would influence him favorably toward a move would be a better climate. Mr. Gordon, although feeling the compliment which the Calvary church has paid him, will consider the matter carefully from every point of view before making a decision.

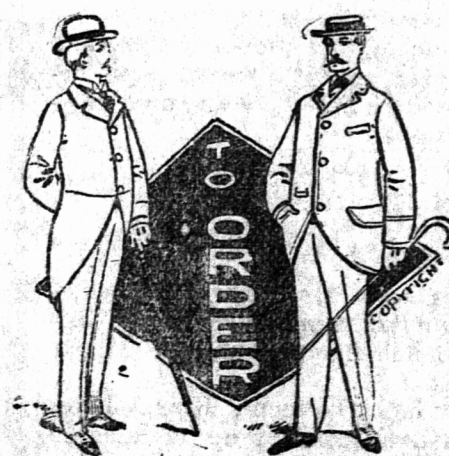
