Eight boats left Cape Travers for the mainland at 7.30 yesterday morning with 35 bags of mail and seven passengers. Among the passengers were Mrs. H. T. Holman, Summer Isle, Benjamin Murray, wife and two children, going to O. J. Six boats arrived from Toronto at 10.35 with 25 bags mail, no passengers.

The Halifax Herald of the 25th contains the following:—Early yesterday morning two men called at the police station and informed Chief of Police Power that someone had broken in their room at the Alexandra House, Brunswick street, and had stolen \$42 out of their clothing. They informed the Chief that they suspected an Englishman who was boarding in the house. After hearing their story, Chief Power came to the conclusion that the money was stolen by a brother of one of the complainants. Special Officer Horace Kennedy was put on the case and shortly afterwards arrested Hudson McLeod, Charlottetown, and a former member of the R. C. P. The most of the stolen money was found in his possession. He will appear before Stipendiary Magistrate this morning.

The funeral of the late Oliver Mason of St. John's which took place on Sunday afternoon, was an occasion which the many friends of the deceased availed themselves to show their respect and sympathy for the departed as well as perhaps to express their sympathy for his sad and sudden death, which is a matter of general regret. The long procession which escorted the body to the cemetery at Clifton, was made up of nearly 300 sleighs, making a funeral cortege of such a length as is rarely witnessed. Although the roads were far from good, and in spite of many other hindrances people from far and near assembled to pay the last tribute possible to the memory of our who was always a good neighbor and sincere and generous friend. The funeral services were conducted by Rev. Mr. Chowan. The pallbearers were Capt. Cameron, James Fairbairn, R. B. Norton, Frank Boyer, G. W. Hibbet and James McCarron.

YESTERDAY, acting under the instructions of the Charlottetown Board of Trade Captain John Gillis of this City made measurements of the thickness of the ice covering Charlottetown Harbor and the Bay outside as far as the ice extended. Twenty-seven measurements were made, all in the channel, which is the course followed by steamers entering and leaving Charlottetown Harbor. The first was made 500 yards from the Brighton range, of the Blockhouse outwards a south course, and at intervals of 250 yds. The first measurement gave 10 inches and the smallest of St. Peter's Island Bar the measurements ran from 16 to 21 inches. Outwards from the bar a south course from the Brighton ranges and until the Brighton and Tea Hill Ranges marked the S. S. W. course the measurements were 23, 22, 24, 22, 23, 33, 22. From that point out to the edge of the water the measurements were 24, 20, 10, 10. Captain Gillis was provided with a pair of very strong marine glasses. With these he saw clear water from Lowther Point (Nine Mile Creek) to Mount Buchanan. There was no ice visible seawards as far as the glasses enabled the Captain to see. The board ice extended to about 1000 yards inside of the Spar Buoy off Fitzroy Rock. No drift or pack ice was to be seen in this distance.

navigation is interrupted in winter, the privileges of Railway and Ice boat transportation free, and respectfully ask a continuance of like privileges under similar circumstances.

### THE TUNNEL

RESOLVED that this Conference of the Boards Trade of Prince Edward Island, convened at Charlottetown, does hereby approve and reaffirm the Resolution passed at a similar meeting on the 10th of March, 1907, with regard to the vexed transportation problem, a copy of which is submitted; and, with the conviction stronger than ever upon them that the only satisfactory impetus of the Terms of Union must be by means of a submarine Tunnel between the Island and the Mainland, urge upon the Federal Government, the absolute necessity of looking into the practicability of such scheme at once; and this determined satisfactorily, as we believe, commence its construction as speedily as possible, the interests of Provincial and Federal progress and as the only satisfaction of the fifth plighted by the high contracting parties at Confederation.

### RESOLUTION OF 1905

Whereas this Province of Prince Edward Island entered the Canadian Confederation under these explicit terms as to communication: "Efficient steam service for the conveyance of mails and passengers to be established and maintained between the Island and the Dominion, winter and summer, thus placing the Island in continuous communication with the Intercolonial Railway and the railway system of the Dominion."

And Whereas these terms have not been fulfilled, to the great hardship of the people and the detriment of the Province.

And Whereas a Tunnel under the Straits from Carleton Place to Money Point, as already surveyed and reported on, by Sir Douglas Fox, is a possible impetus of said Terms of Confederation.

Therefore Resolved, that this meeting of the people of Prince Edward Island in general Convention assembled do hereby call upon the Federal Government to fulfill the said Terms of Union forthwith by causing such Tunnel to be constructed at the earliest possible moment;

And Further Resolved, that pending the construction of such Tunnel we demand that daily communication by navigation be maintained by the construction and operation of a third powerful steamer of the most approved ice-breaking type.
