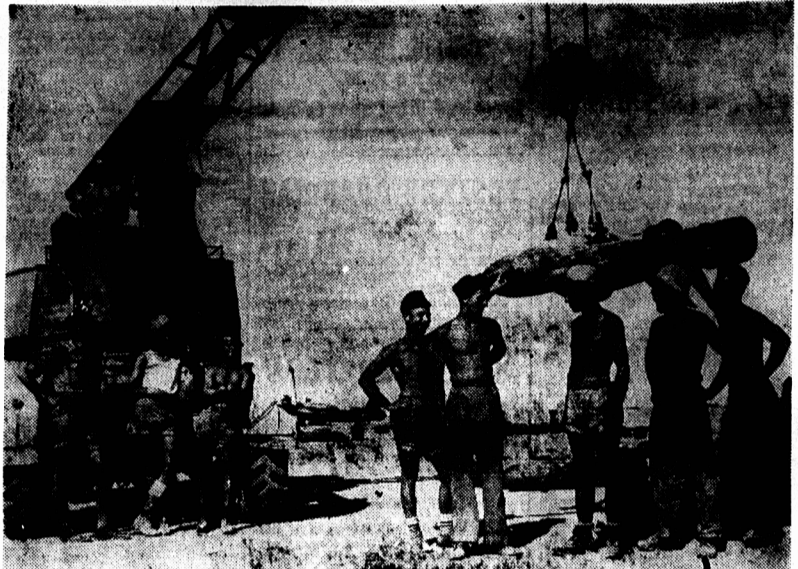
More Cheques Cashed In Oct.

OTTAWA, Nov. 23.—(CP)—Cheques cashed by the chartered banks against individual accounts was \$4,534,206,673 during October compared with \$4,488,033,586 in September and \$4,073,390,537 in October last year, the Dominion Bureau of Statistics reported today. The 14.3 per cent increase over last October reflected heavy payments on the Fifth Victory Loan, the expansion of productive operations and moderate increases in prices. Debits during the first 10 months of this year totalled \$43,032,809,594 compared with \$36,365,082,629 in the same period of 1942, an increase of 18.3 per cent.

LOTS OF STOCKINGS

Fly Planes From Canada To Russia

OTTAWA, Nov. 23.—(CP)—Military aircraft revealed in Washington today to be flying a northwestern Canadian ferry route from the United States to Russia are following a chain of seven airports—most of them war-built—from Edmonton to Alaska. The northwestern ferry route was disclosed by Robert P. Patterson United States under-secretary of war before a senate committee investigating the Canal oil project. Construction of the chain was started on the suggestion of the joint defence board which made it one of its first recommendations. Early surveys made by Canadian forces enabled swift completion of the route.

From Edmonton the planes fly to Grand Prairie, Fort St. John, Fort Nelson, Watson Lake, Whitehorse and then on to Fairbanks, Alaska. The distance between fields is comparatively short, providing emergency landing facilities and allowing for short hops by craft with a limited range. SPRINGFIELD W. I. Price Board Convictions

Selling and offering used clothing at unlawfully high prices cost a dealer, carrying on business under several trade names at St. Zacharie, Quebec, \$1,000 last week. This was only one of 96 cases reported by the Enforcement Administration of the Wartime Prices and Trade Board for the week. Offences in 52 of these cases were breaches of the Board regulations and the remaining 44 for violations of the rulings of the Department of Munitions and Supply. Two Prince Edward Island residents received court sentences for contraventions of gasoline rationing regulations, the report shows. These were the only cases prosecuted by the Board in this province during the week. One of the stiffest penalties handed out by the courts was imposed on a soft drink bottling company at Vernon, B.
