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## Trouble Brewing In Central America

(Canadian Press)  
WASHINGTON, Dec. 28.—Nicaragua has dispatched a vigorous protest to Honduras as a result of a reported raid by Honduran troops into Nicaraguan territory. Detailed information regarding the incident is lacking here, but in some Latin-American quarters there is a fear that the situation may lead to serious international consequences.

For several weeks a serious internal situation has appeared to be developing in Honduras in connection with the rivalries of candidates for the presidency. A week ago a censorship was declared and only a few scraps of information as to later developments have been permitted to reach the outside world.

## U. S. IS BLAMED FOR CONDITIONS IN EUROPE

PARIS, Dec. 28.—United States was held chiefly responsible for the present conditions in Europe by Deputy Paul Reynaud speaking in the Chamber of Deputies during the regular Friday interpellations on the government's foreign policy. M. Reynaud said: "America weighs on England's shoulders and England weighs on ours, and we are a burden to Germany. This is the strangely impressive pyramid. America will never relieve us of what we owe her."

This Triumph Clears Road for a General Advance Of Revolutionary Army—Peace Move Rumored

VERA CRUZ, Dec. 28.—General Lazaro Cardenas, and his entire staff and 300 cavalry have been taken prisoner by the revolutionary forces, according to a statement issued tonight at general headquarters here. Of Naval Experts if Held in Capital of Switzerland

PARIS, Dec. 28.—Russia's refusal to attend the January meeting of the naval experts is likely to lead to the session being held in London instead of at Geneva. The Soviet Government, in what League officials describe as the most polite note ever sent by the Soviet to the League, declared it was willing to attend the naval experts' meeting if it was not held on Swiss soil. Its objection to being represented in Switzerland, it was added, was due to the assassination of M. Vorovsky, Russia's representative at Lausanne and the acquittal of Conradi, the Swiss engineer who shot him.

## CHURCH UNION MOVEMENT IN ENG. CAUSES STIR

LONDON, Dec. 28.—The published letter from the Archbishop of Canterbury revealing negotiations between the Church of England and the Church of Rome has aroused keen discussion throughout the country. Many see a similar trend in Church circles to that obvious at present in politics—that is a trend toward two great divisions, right and left, Christian and Radical. According to many Low Churchmen this trend will mean the forcing of that wing of the Anglican communion into closer union with nonconformists, while the high church adherents will move closer to Rome. The Church union movement in Canada is being watched closely by the Nonconformist body here and if successful will undoubtedly result in a similar development in Britain. Low Churchmen strenuously oppose any approach toward reunion with Rome and predict a decisive Anglican split if the matter mover any farther. All prominent
