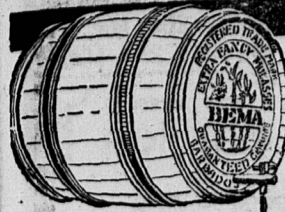

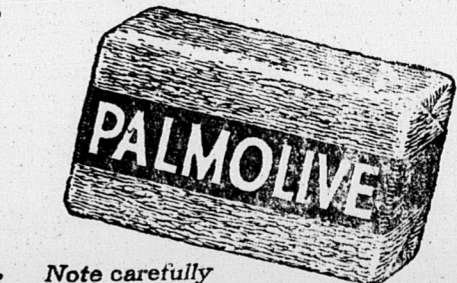

THE MARKETS

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Que., Sept. 9.—The export trade in Canadian grain on the Montreal market today was quiet, there being only sales of a few loads of oats and the bids on barley were 9d per quarter out of line. The domestic business was also slow and the market was generally inactive. Sales of Ontario and Quebec No. 2 white oats were made at 49 1/2 cents, and No. 3 white at 48 cents per bushel, ex-supply.
