TROOPS IN KIEFF AS PRECAUTION

KIEFF, Nov. 11, (Special)—Troops in considerable numbers are being drafted in Kieff as a precautionary move in the event of anti-Semitic outbreaks as a result of the trial of Mendel Beiliss, who is charged with ritual murder.

At today's session of the trial Mr. Shmakoff, representative of the anti-Semites, made an appeal to anti-Jewish prejudice. He alluded to the large financial resources of the Jewish race and alleged that their money had enabled them to control the newspapers in favor of Beiliss. He described Dr. Sikorski, who last week in an anti-Semitic diatribe before the court declared that ritual murder was not the myth of popular prejudice but a reality of the twentieth century, as standing on the brink of the grave and therefore fearless in speaking the truth.

Mr. Shmakoff pictured the Jews as regarding Christians as animals to be destroyed without compunction. He said he did not desire that a severe penalty be inflicted on Beiliss, but he asked the jury to convict the prisoner so as to bring joy to millions of anxious Russian mothers.

Mr. Vladimir Maklakoff, leading counsel for Beiliss, followed Mr. Shmakoff with an analysis of many of the weak points of the case of the prosecution.

CHARGED WITH SMUGGLING JEWELRY FROM CANADA.

CLEVELAND, O., Nov. 10.—David Fertel, a jeweler, was arrested here this afternoon on a charge of smuggling watches and jewelry into Cleveland from Canada. The arrest was made by Captain Washer, of the United States Secret Service. It is charged that Fertel belonged to an organization which in the last year has illicitly brought \$50,000 worth of jewelry into this country. Federal officers arrested his brother-in-law, William Levy, on a similar charge two weeks ago. Fertel's bond was fixed at \$5,000.

GERMANY TO SEND WARSHIPS ACROSS THE ATLANTIC.

BERLIN, Nov. 10.—The two largest German battleships now in commission, the 24,700-ton super-Dreadnoughts Kaiser and Koenig Albert, will sail early in December for an extended cruise in east African and South American waters, accompanied by the new protected cruiser Straasburg. It is semi-officially stated that the object is to "try the vessels out on a foreign cruise lasting three or four months."

German naval circles regard the South American cruise as patent evidence that Anglo-German tension is disappearing, as this is the first time German battleships have been detached from the North Sea since the naval rivalry between Germany and Great Britain became acute. The usually well-formed naval correspondent of The Lokal Anzeiger says that Germany's finest warships will be sent across the Atlantic, undoubtedly in response to the long-expressed wish of hundreds of thousands of Germans resident in South America "again to see a piece of their Fatherland as a visible indication of her power and greatness."

SOCIALISTS HAVE ADOPTED SUFFRAGETTE TACTICS.

LONDON, Nov. 10.—The Socialists have adopted suffragette tactics, and have decided to oppose all Liberal candidates and refuse them hearing at public meetings until James Larkin, the leader of the striking transport workers, who was recently sentenced to seven months imprisonment at Dublin, is released. The Right Hon. Charles Frederick Masterman, M.P., for Bethnal Green and financial secretary to the Treasury, was the first victim. He was howled down today when he attempted to speak at the Shoreditch Tabernacle. A small party of men kept up a continual cry for the release of Larkin, but eventually the police were called to clear the church. A demonstration was held at Dublin today by the strikers in celebration of the "Success of the Socialists in keeping the Liberal candidate out in Reading." This had reference to the success of Captain Wilson the Unionist candidate, in capturing the Reading seat yesterday, when the Socialist, Mr. Butler, cut into the Liberal vote.

PLEAD WITH YUAN TO RESTORE PARTY

PEKIN, Nov. 11, (Special)—As neither House of the Chinese Parliament is able to form a quorum the leaders of the other parties are endeavoring to persuade the government to return their credentials to the less hostile members of the democratic party, or the Kwo Nim Tang, all of whom, about three hundred, had been expelled from Parliament by Presidential proclamation. The party was formerly led by Dr. Sun Yat Sen, the first Provisional President of China, now in exile.

The Speaker of the Assembly, Tang Hua Lung, has requested the remaining members of Parliament to stay in Peking and strive for the maintenance of the Parliamentary institutions, as he states that the termination of there will mean the ending of the Chinese Republic.

It was reliably reported today that the Chinese military leaders had been urging President Yuan for months to assume control, arguing that government with a Parliament in China was impossible.

MICHIGAN ARRIVED IN DAMAGED CONDITION.

BOSTON, Nov. 10.—Showing the effects of continuous bad weather, the steamer Michigan arrived from Liverpool today, four days behind her schedule. On October 31, she lost most of her portable deck fittings, and the bridge was damaged when the vessel was swept by a huge wave. The Michigan left Liverpool October 25, and met only 48 hours of fair weather on her passage.
