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## DALADIER BREAKS STRIKE WITH TROOPS

### FASCIST LEADER SLAIN IN MASS KILLING WITH TROOPS

#### WAS REPORTED ATTEMPTING PRISON BREAK

Chief And 13 Followers Of Band Wiped Out By Prison Guard.

**BUCHAREST, Nov. 30—(A. P.)—**Rumania's "Little Hitler" was slain today in a mass killing which wiped out the leadership of the outlawed Fascist Iron Guard. Corneliu Codreanu, 39, chieftain of the secret organization, and 13 of his followers fell this morning on the road from Rumnik-Sarapris to Bucharest under the volley of a prison guard detail. An official announcement said they had tried to escape. Five hours later they were buried secretly in a prison graveyard.

Have News Agency gave the list of those killed with Codreanu: St. Nicholas Constantinou, Ion Carandiu and Dozu Dillimau, sentenced to life imprisonment for the assassination of Premier Ion Duca in 1932; Ion Garabance, Joseph Bazman, Stefan Gurca, Ion Pie In Sade, Ion Atanasiu, Gabriel Bagan and Radu Vlad, serving the sentences for the murder of 100000 Stefan Georgeescu in 1928; and Stefan Georgeescu in 10 years at hard labor for the Stancu killing.

Codreanu was serving a sentence for treason at Rumnik-Sarapris, taken taken with the 13 others in open cars for a trip under guard to Bucharest for questioning concerning an attack attributed to the Iron Guardists.

The attack was that of Flory Ganes, rector of the University of Cluj, who was shot and critically wounded Monday. The attack on the rector was said to be part of a large-scale Iron Guard conspiracy for rebellion which police presumed had been directed by Codreanu from his prison cell.

The police account of the shooting said the procession of automobiles was halted a short distance from the prison by armed men who rushed from a roadside wood. The women discarded orders to remain in the automobiles, it was said, and there was a blast of gunfire in which all 14 were killed. The guards were exonerated.

Military and civil authorities hurried to the scene of the shooting and found prison guards had acted lawfully by commanding their prisoners to halt before firing.

The mass shooting had a stunning effect on Rumania. Codreanu—long counted as one of Rumania's half-god leading personalities—had passed and with him a name that had brought terror to many political leaders.

Codreanu had retained his influence despite his imprisonment for months. He was sentenced to 10 years' imprisonment. His death brought consideration to the underground terrorist organization he headed.

Removal of Codreanu and the 13 others seemed to strengthen the position of King Carol, who has energetically backed his Government's efforts to suppress terrorism.

#### Scotsmen Honor St. Andrew's Day

Enjoyable Banquet And Post-prandial Speeches At Caledonian Club Function Last Night.

St. Andrew's anniversary was fittingly observed last night by members and friends of the Caledonian Club, who gathered in large numbers at the Caledonian Hotel for an enjoyable banquet and programme of song and speech-making.

The speakers were Ex-Chief Malcolm MacKinnon, who responded to the toast of the day, and "The Land of the Heather" with an entertaining account of his visit to Scotland two years ago; Mr. A. E. MacLean, P. E., who spoke on "Our Great Dominion"; Hon. B. W. LePage, representing the Provincial Government, and His Worship Mayor Foster.

President W. R. Shaw presided and extended well-merited compliments to the speakers. Preceded by Pipe Major W. Burke of the P. E. I. Highlanders, the music was borne in with the customary ceremony by Clandinin Major James Walker and was acclaimed in Burns' spirited "Address to the Haggis," delivered by Clandinin Judge D. Edgar Shaw. The rendition of Scottish songs by Mrs. Frances Holl Trainor, Mrs. Marguerite Cudmore and Miss Vera Malcom, was a popular feature of the programme, which was under the musical direction of Mrs. Trainor. Mr. Robert Blanchard was accompanist for the soloists.

Message From Lt. Governor  
The following message was read from His Honour Lieutenant Governor DeBlois:

"Dear Mr. Shaw.—While I regret that owing to unavoidable circumstances it will be impossible for me to attend the banquet tomorrow night, yet I assure you it is a pleasure and an honour for me to pay tribute to the Patron Saint of the Province. Surely it is typical of the Scottish people that they should choose for their Patron Saint one who endured many hardships, who was a true leader of men and whose life was devoted to the carrying out of a great purpose. I believe that nowhere in the world could be found a more noble figure than that of St. Andrew. With my best wishes for a very happy gathering of the Clan."

After extending a cordial welcome to all present, President Shaw referred to the links of Scottish ancestry and tradition binding this province and other sections of Canada with the Old Land—links which were growing stronger with the passing years.

He noted with regret the deaths during the year of many prominent Clansmen and citizens, naming Ex-Mayor L. B. Miller, Judge Stewart P. Sinclair, M. P., C. D., Bell, Prof. H. A. Tanton, Hon. Justice Hazard, Charles E. MacKinnon, George S. MacKinnon, D. K. Currie, and Robert Lamont.

#### JUSTICE TILLEY URGES UNITY FOR DEFENCE

Shares Speaking Honors With Premier Campbell At Halifax Gathering.

LONDON, Nov. 30—(AP)—Sir Oswald Mosley, British Fascist leader, announced today he married Mrs. Diana Guinness, an admirer of Nazi Germany, about 10 years ago and that a son was born to them last Saturday.

In a long statement in "Action" the journal of the British Union of Fascists, Sir Oswald said "it is now necessary to publish the facts of my marriage" and that "both mother and son are doing well."

Mr. Justice Tilley shared the speaking honors with Premier Thane A. Campbell of Prince Edward Island, replying to the toast to Scotland, Premier Campbell praised the institutions on which Scottish life was built—the church, school, home and individual.

Unemployed Youth  
Mr. Justice Tilley estimated Canada's unemployed youth at not less than 240,000. They were drifting aimlessly and he asked what his listeners would do if they were "dictators" of a democratic government.

We would form a labor battalion and set the young Canadians at work building fortifications on the Atlantic and Pacific coasts. We would form a militia battalion which would do domestic service for three years' domestic service and we would form agricultural societies in each province and train young farmers in the art of agriculture.

Mr. Justice Tilley saw one mistake in the negotiations leading up to Confederation. "We should have gone into the Dominion after we had formed the Maritime Union."

Scots and Scottish organizations had a responsibility to propagate in this North British America all the nobles of Scotland's traditions and Scotland's heritage.

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#### NEW WAVE OF SUICIDES BY JEWS IN REICH

**BERLIN, Nov. 30—(AP)—**A wave of Jewish suicides was reported by responsible persons today to have spread throughout Germany as the Nazis decreed new "Ghetto" measures.

Rabbi worked long hours conducting funerals. They and other authorities sources were forbidden to disclose how many killed themselves or died suddenly from causes attributed directly to Anti-Jewish actions.

Police in all parts of Germany were empowered by a new order to forbid Jews to appear in certain districts or leave home at certain times.

A new attack on the United States was opened by the newspaper Frankfurter Tageszeitung, organ of strongly Anti-Jewish Julius Streicher, Nazi leader of Franconia.

The newspaper called the United States a "land of Lynch Justice, kidnaping, false prophets and strip dancers" and added:

"While America mixes in the most violent manner in the affairs of Germany and attempts over the Jews without helping them it forgets completely to tend to its own affairs. They are dirty enough and we all have reason enough to remind them."

Official hindrances to Jewish emigration continued. A new decisive measure required Jews to get special authorization cards before Jan. 1. These will serve to distinguish them from the rest of the population and must carry as first names the prescribed "Israel" for males and "Sarah" for females.

The official Gazette printed the heading "police order regarding the appearance of Jews in public places." The regulation declared "the proper provincial police department" may forbid German Jews or Jews without nationality to appear in public places and to leave their homes at definite times.

The sudden deaths of both men and women fall into two classifications:

1. Those who could not stand the unaccustomed rigors of concentration camps and either died while still confined or shortly after their release from the effects. Jewish sources estimated that 6000 Jews have been taken to concentration camps.

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2. Men and women who died after heart attacks resulting from grief over the fate of relatives and friends or from strain and excitement of repeated searches by police and the destruction of their property.

#### French Premier Scores Victory In Labor Test

Will Now Take Up Campaign For Parliamentary Approval Of Decrees. Broadcasts Thanks To Workers.

**PARIS, Nov. 30—(AP)—**Labor disorders broke out in eight French cities tonight after Premier Edouard Daladier had smashed a nationwide general strike with the threat of armed force and by military law.

At Toulouse three police inspectors and the mayor of the city were injured in clashes between strikers and police.

Large groups of workers paraded through the main streets of the city, smashing windows of stores and automobiles.

Mobile guards charged the crowd several times before restoring order. At Clermont Ferrand groups of strikers smashed store windows and attempted to seize the general commanding troops guarding the city. He brandished his revolver and escaped in an automobile.

The disorders broke out as workers left their jobs after enforced working hours.

**PARIS, Nov. 30—(A. P.)—**Premier Daladier quickly suppressed a general strike by a show of military power today and ordered for France a three-year state of "economic mobilization."

The general strike, by which organized labor sought to tie up France for one day in protest against the Government's economic program, was the first big challenge to Daladier's regime.

This disposed of, the Premier turned to a campaign of parliamentary approval of his decrees which imposed new taxes and suspended the 40-hour week.

"Economic mobilization" was decreed in the "national interest," the Government said in explanation of its 1930 budget demands. The full text of an explanatory note was made public today.

"During the whole (three-year) plan," the note said, "the French must understand they are in a state of economic mobilization."

Broadcasts Thanks  
Daladier broadcast his thanks to workers tonight for disregarding the general strike order.

He said Nov. 30 would remain "an historic date" in French history because it was marked by a renewal of respect for law and respect for order throughout the nation.

He declared the general strike order had met "total defeat" and emphasized the Government would continue its efforts to improve the national position domestically as well as internationally.

The 24-hour strike call was met head-on by Daladier; within a few hours the movement had crumpled.

#### Independence Of Scot Held Need

**OTTAWA, Nov. 30—(CP)—**A symptom of the delirium that affects the world today is that "people are afraid to stand on their own feet," Lord Tweedsmuir told the local St. Andrew's Society at its annual banquet here tonight.

"They seem to want to huddle together for security, and to sell their souls to a dictator or to a machine," said His Excellency. He was sure that the spirit of independence which dominated Scotland was a safeguard against this.

#### Arrest Made In "Break" At DeBlois Bros.

Tipped off by a call from a watchman City Police surrounded DeBlois Bros. Wholesale warehouse on Lower Queen Street early this morning and arrested Patrick Loughran, Charlottetown man when they found him inside the building, Sergeant Watson, region officer in charge of the midnight shift, announced.

Entrance to the building was made by breaking a glass in the Queen Street entrance Police said.

Police were called by Gordon Lund, watchman at the Charlottetown Ice Sales at 3 A. M. and informed that William Chase, another watchman in the area had heard a glass being broken in DeBlois Bros. building. Sergeant Higgins, who took the call, together with Constable L. A. McInnis hurried to the scene. Meanwhile, L. A. McInnis and Constable Watson and Gordon Storey called the station and learned of the reported break. Commanding a taxi they joined their fellow officers and surrounded the building. During the search of the premises Sergeant Higgins made the arrest. The man arrested had in his possession packages of cigarettes on his person, Police said.

#### Broadway "Hooper" In Flight Epoch

**NEW YORK, Nov. 30—Joanny Jones, former Broadway "hooper," completed in 30 hours, 47 minutes today the first non-stop trans-continental flight in the lightest airplane made to date.**

#### Discuss Part To Be Played By Boy Scouts In Royal Visit

**OTTAWA, Nov. 30—(CP)—**The part to be played by boy scouts during the Canadian tour of the King and Queen late next spring was discussed here today at a meeting of the executive committee of the General Council of the Boy Scouts Association of Canada.

Lord Tweedsmuir attended as Chief Scout for Canada and Sir Edward Beatty as President of the Association.

The Governor General said that the Scouts desired to see as much as possible of the youth of Canada, including the boy scouts and girl guides. While tentative plans for the visit were discussed, it was possible the King and Queen might formally review rallies of scouts and guides. His Excellency said he hoped local reception committees would not overlook them in their plans.

Lord Tweedsmuir said he was prepared to invite the scouts and guides of Ottawa to the Rideau Hall grounds, not to be reviewed but to ensure Their Majesties an opportunity of seeing and being seen by them.
