In addition, in response to hearty and prolonged applause, a serenade by Borodin, an English folk song, "The Keeper," and two Sailors' Chanties, "Yankee Harbour" and "Billy Boy," were given as encores.

The London Singers who assisted Mr. Goss are Mr. Frank Hunt, tenor, Mr. A. W. Whitehead, alto, Mr. Robert Rowell, bass and Mr. David Carver, baritone. Mr. Carver also being the pianist for the songs which had an instrumental accompaniment.

The taste shown in the selection of the programme was such, and the musical abilities and artistic merit of the ensemble are of so high an order that it is a very difficult task to select outstanding numbers for special praise. But the first must be attempted. In the first group the three numbers from Ravenscroft were very fine, but the song "A Robyn, Gentry Robyn," which is used by Shakespeare in Act IV of "Twelfth Night," appealed greatly to this listener, in its sturdy old English harmonies suggesting those of Byrd and Gibbons.

And of course, the group of three songs by Purcell which followed it continued in the same stout tradition. Of these "Pie, Nay Prithce John," a contrapuntal representation of a tavern brawl, was perhaps the best example.

Of the group of German Lieders, the "Trink-Kanon" of Mozart, as also "Die Rose stand im Tau" of Schumann and the Brahms vocal solo "In Waldesamkeit" which was sung by Mr. Goss, were very lovely.

In the folk song group are many things that the writer found most delightful. The melody of "O Waly Waly," an English version of a Scottish Ballad known as "The Lament of the Marchioness of Douglas," was very poignant, as was also that of the strange and mystical "Corpus Christi" carol. The Gaelic melody "Xont the Coolins," a song of Hebridean origin, was magnificent, and was much appreciated by the audience as was evidenced by their loud applause.

The fine arrangement by Dr. Healey Willan of the familiar rollicking ballad "Ten Thousand Miles Away" was also greatly enjoyed.

A word as to the selection of the programme. In the past one has become rather "fed up" on the empty pretentiousness of many of the so called "Ari Songs" and it really is a great relief to hear a programme in which this sort of thing has been studiously avoided. It was evident that the folk songs, really in its simplicity art at its highest. In this connection the writer would suggest to vocalists that there are many lovely Gaelic melodies from Ireland and the Scottish Highlands which are deserving of a place on many a concert programme. And the clean and sturdy Elizabethan songs too, should be heard far oftener than they are.

One looks forward with eagerness to the next presentation of the Charlottetown Community Concert Association.

Gross Earnings C. P. R. Declined In November

MONTREAL, Nov. 29 - Although gross earnings of the Canadian Pacific Railway in October were down \$1,484,318 from the same month last year, net profits decreased only \$553,089, an official statement issued today showed. Gross earnings for the month under review were \$12,279,731 and net profits \$3,923,573. Working expenses were lowered from \$9,287,386 to \$8,356,157.

For the first ten months of 1932 gross earnings were down from \$122,351,685 to \$103,504,681 as compared with last year's figures while net profits decreased from \$17,268,829 to \$14,454,943.

U.S. Rugby Takes Toll Of 37 Lives NEW YORK, Nov. 29 - Despite added safeguards in the rules, death again took heavy toll of football players in the United States and territories during the season now drawing to a close, records today showed 37 succumbed to injuries in games on sandlot, club, municipal, high school and college gridirons.

With most high school schedules completed, the total for the year probably will fall well below the record number of 50 fatally injured in 1931 but the present figure is the second greatest for any year since national records were kept Up to 1931 the largest number was 20 in 1925.

Of the 37 dead, five were college players, 17 high school, and 11 sandlot, semi-pro and club team competitors.
