"Keep Punchin" Manager Red Dutton Tells Improved New York American Team

Vanderbilt To Build New Defender

NEW YORK, Oct. 29—(AP)—Harold S. Vanderbilt, skipper of the victorious defender Rainbow in the 1934 America's cup yacht races has taken over the task of financing a new cup defender to meet the new challenge from T. O. M. Sopwith's Endeavour II next summer.

Vanderbilt announced his plan today through the New York Yacht Club. At the same time it was definitely announced that the first race of the 1937 series will be sailed, weather permitting, Saturday, July 31. There will be no race on Sunday but thereafter there will be races every day until one yacht has gained the necessary four victories.

The word that Vanderbilt had assumed the entire burden of building the defender came after efforts to form a syndicate to finance the yacht had failed. There was a possibility one of the existing American class J yachts, known to be slower than Sopwith's New Endeavour, would be named to defend the historic trophy.

NEW YORK, Oct. 29—(CP)—A fighting manager, Mervin "the Red" Dutton, chalked up a sign in the dressing room of the New York American hockey club late last season. It read: "Keep punchin'." The team did that and reached the semi-final round of the National League's Stanley cup playoffs for the first time in its 11-year history.

That fighting phrase still hangs in full view of the Americans as they train for the 1936-37 campaign at Oshawa, Ont. And the team carries on there as aggressively as in the late stages of last season's campaign.

The recent ruling of NHL Governors that the Amerks franchise was forfeit for failure to liquidate debts, and counter claims of owner big Bill Dwyer that the players are his personal property and will not step on the ice under league direction without a court joust, has apparently not affected the players.

Reports reaching headquarters here daily indicate Manager Dutton will start the campaign in Chicago, Nov. 5 with an outfit considerably stronger than the one finally knocked out of the last cup semi-finals.

At defence and centre the Americans seem due to show marked improvement. Allan Shields, a clever blocker has been secured from Montreal Maroons and Dutton plans to team the burly blond Otawan with the hard-hitting Allan Murray as the first string rearguard. To help further, Johnny Gallagher was purchased from Detroit. Should Gallagher stage a real comeback, the Amerk defence promises to be stronger than it has been in years.

The old, reliable Roy "Shrimp" Worters will again guard the cage and with strong blockers in front of him, Dutton feels little worry over that post.

Dave "Sweeney" Schriener, the League's leading marksman, Art Chapman, the great playmaker at centre and Lorne Carr at right wing, will again bear the brunt of Americans offensive duties.

A veteran trio likely made up of Joe Lamb at centre, and Hal Cotton and Harry Oliver on the wings, gives the team a line to shoot into action in any tight spots where experience is needed.

Bruins Blank Maroons 1-0 To Take Lead In Series

MONCTON, N.B., Oct. 29—(CP)—Boston Bruins—still without Eddie Shore—moved ahead of the Montreal Maroons in their Maritime pre-season exhibition series tonight with a 1-0 victory.

Despite a driving rain about 4,000 people saw the two powerful National Hockey League teams in action and flashes of mid-season form in the final period as the players pressed hard for the winning goal.

"Red" Beattie, burly forward for the Art Ross clan, fired in the winning tally just a minute and ten seconds before the final gong. "Headline" Hollett, who turned in a brilliant performance for the Bruins, engineered the score as he passed to Beattie after cleverly drawing the defence. Beattie's first shot was blocked by Conacher but the burly red-head recovered quickly and fired it into the corner of the cage.

The teams worked cautiously throughout the first period with territory play about even and the rival defences and goalies blocking the attackers with regularity.

In the second period there were flashes of speed and the Bruins showed a slight edge. But in the third the Boston club carried the play and deserved their victory.

The Cowley-Cook-Sands line worked well for the winners while the line of Gracie-Bilco and Robinson seemed the pick of the Maroons. Hooley Smith, who joined the Bruins recently, turned out tonight and played an effective game on defence. His poke-checking was always a source of trouble to marauding Maroons.

Tomorrow the teams move into Halifax where they will play two games and then conclude their Maritime series here next Wednesday night.

Patrick To Test Rebuilt Team Tonight

WINNIPEG, Oct. 29—(CP)—Two Professional hockey teams will face their first real test of the season here tomorrow when the rebuilt New York Rangers tangle with their "farmhands" Philadelphia Ramblers, in the first of a two-game exhibition series.

Lester Patrick, Manager and Coach of Rangers, said he would send his complete National Hockey League squad into the contest with Herb Gardiner's International-American League outfit.

After 10 days training here, six of last year's Rambler team have gained regular berths with Rangers and five new faces have been added to the farm roster.

The first game will feature a struggle of veterans against the predominant youth of the two clubs. Probable lineup will bring Rangers' line of Cecil Dillon, Frankie Boucher and Lynn Patrick against the new Rambler line, Bobby Kirk, Clint Smith and Bryan Hextall.

Alternating trios bring Rangers' "kid line" of Mac Colville, Neil Colville and Alec Shibley against Ramblers' veterans, Bert Connolly, formerly of Moncton Hawks, Danny Cox and Charlie Mason.

Prince Of Wales Ruggers Defeat Second Saints In Opening Game Of Series 9-0

Prince of Wales 1936-37 rugby edition took a toe-hold on the best two out of three series in defense of their Intermediate crown by turning back the threat of the second Saint Dunstan's team 9-0 yesterday afternoon on a rain-drenched field at the C. A. A. grounds.

The red and blue jerseyed squad scored two touchdowns in the first half and one in the second. All three went unconverted. The first try of the game came about the middle of the first half when Grant raced 20 yards to place the ball behind the Saints' line. Doug Saunders failed to convert from a difficult angle. Saunders ran the city collegians count up to six when he accepted Grant's pass to run the remaining 15 yards for the try. Harold Stewart found difficulty with the wet ball, and failed to garner the additional two points in a convert in front of the uprights. The final score of the game came a minute from the final whistle when Hughes plunged over the line. Stewart again failed to convert.

The Prince of Wales ruggers, adorned in their new attractive uniforms, kept the Saints on the defensive for the most part with a great display of speed and were rarely if ever in danger of being scored upon. The Saints scrum, however, controlled the ball but the backfield failed to break clear from the fast-travelling Prince of Wales pick.

The game was played on a rain-swept field that made good football impossible.

Last night, it was Harry Balanc the "battering brakeman" from New York's Little Italy, who did the experts wrong by looking like a preliminary boy against Eddie Jacobs' Hippodrome punch boy.

Somehow, we don't blame the experts as much as we do the boxing promoters' press agents, who are getting so good they are hard to resist.

It is true that Harry won 16 out of 20 professional bouts with a knockout, but he didn't meet any Mickey Walkers along the road. His victims were mostly second or third raters, however, that wasn't Promoter Mike Jacobs' fault because there aren't many first raters around any more. The woods are full of fellows who'd be lucky to be selling programs at fights during the heyday of Jack Dempsey and Harry Greb.

Balsamo can hit, make no mistake about that. He may yet become a champion. He's a middle-weight copy of Luis Firpo, the "wild bull of the pampas," running in with a right that carries dynamite, but as a boxer he's a great subversive brakeman.

Yet, the boxing experts have plenty of company this fall. Look at the football experts. They're so groggy with upsets they can't run away from their heeklers.
