THE Government dredge, Montagu, which has been operating at Victoria was towed in port Thursday evening by the tug Islander.

THE death took place at Bedford, Eng., on the 13th of November, of Caroline, widow of the late Colonel, the Hon. John Hamilton-Gray, C. M. G., late 7th Dragoon Guards, of Charlottetown.

J. SOMERLED MACLEOD, well known in football circles in this City, has been doing splendid work in helping the Mt. Allison College team on the road to victory.

THE Bankers and the Prince of Wales football teams will line up for a friendly discussion as to which is the better at football this afternoon. Victoria Park is to be the scene of the encounter and the hour has been set down at 3.30.

THE schooner A. J. McKean, news of the wreck of which, and the death of her captain will be found in The Guardian's telegraph despatches today was well known in Charlottetown Harbor. She was formerly owned by the Portland Packing Company, and has done a lot of trading in and out of this port.

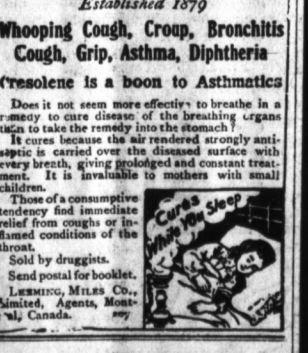

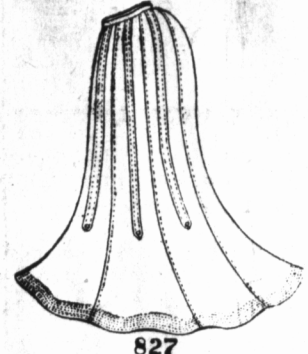
