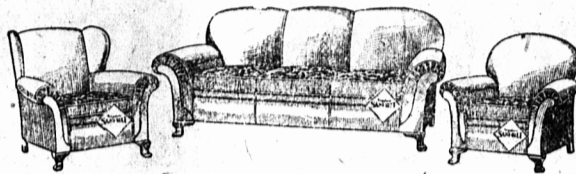

A Clergyman's Opinion of Life Insurance

Toronto Saturday Night says:—One of the prominent Presbyterian ministers in Australia, the Rev. James Gillespie, who is very well known on the North Coast, makes a point of regularly referring very definitely to two matters of growing importance—the making of a will and the taking out of a life assurance policy. During his sermon at Coraki Presbyterian Church lately he said it is simply amazing what people will do—or rather not do—in the matter. He had actually met a man 84 years of age who, when he was ill and was spoken to about his will, said he would wait until he was well, which, naturally enough, never came to pass. The speaker then referred to life assurance, and urged upon the young people present the duty of taking up this form of saving. He stated that if only those who indulged in smoking would just give half of what is usually spent in that way quite a nice provision could be made for later years. He did not desire to say anything about whether people should smoke or not. He simply wanted to show that if half the amount spent in cigarettes were put into a policy it would be possible to have a fund of from \$3,000 upwards available at 65, when plenty would find a sum like that very useful. Of course, it could easily be made available earlier at a slightly increased premium if desired. Much of the anxiety that meets people in later years could be avoided by exercising some res-

Germany's Desire To Recover Her Lost Colonies

GRAVE PROBLEM FOR THE LEAGUE OF NATIONS GENEVA, Nov. 4.—Germany's known desire to get back at least one of the many colonies which she lost as a result of the World's War, is a grave problem which is now confronting the League of Nations. The problem is felt here to be all the more grave because no light is seen as to how the question is to be solved. Germany is known to be keenly desirous of getting back out of more colonies, but apparently is approaching this delicate matter with great caution. She hopes that perhaps she will be able to get satisfaction through private conversations with representatives of the other powers and has already taken the matter up in the now famous parley at Thoiry between Foreign Minister Briand, of France and Foreign Minister Stresemann of Germany. Recent developments at Geneva indicate a tendency on the part of the countries which inherited Germany's colonies, under the form of mandates, to get into the habit of regarding their position in these countries as more or less permanent.
