The first time Bing Crosby and Barry Fitzgerald got together in a picture, "Going My Way," they made screen history. Well, history, as it usually does, repeats itself today at the Prince Edward Theatre with Paramount's "Welcome Stranger," the new and even better joint effort of this terrific twosome.
