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Highlanders Parade This Afternoon

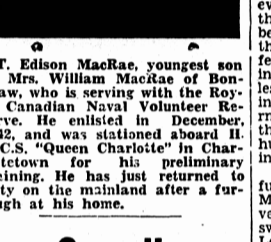
The Pictou Highlanders, a reserve army unit in camp here, will be seen in a route march through Charlottetown Streets about 2:30 this afternoon.

(Continued from page one) to the destroyer strength of the Canadian Navy which is unofficially placed at 18 and which Navy Minister Macdonald, recently reported was "more than 12 and not quite 24."

Another Tribal Class destroyer, H.M.C.S. Haida, is under construction for Canada and the first of a class of three larger Tribal Class destroyers to be built in Canada, are under construction at Halifax.

Amos, director of professional education in Ontario, and at the University of Toronto, where he worked in music, handicraft and art.

Those who have attended summer school may have to relieve the teacher shortage in Prince Edward Island to a degree as several high school graduates took courses with the expectation of receiving teachers' licenses in this province.

Fleets of airplanes took up the pursuit of the Axis rearguard with bomb and gunfire attacks on roads, beaches and rail lines in southern Italy yesterday. They sank eight boats and barges along the Italian coast carrying troops seeking safety in the north by sea.
