Misses Ina and Eva Carrier, of Mt. Herbert, spent the week end at their home in Cherry Valley.

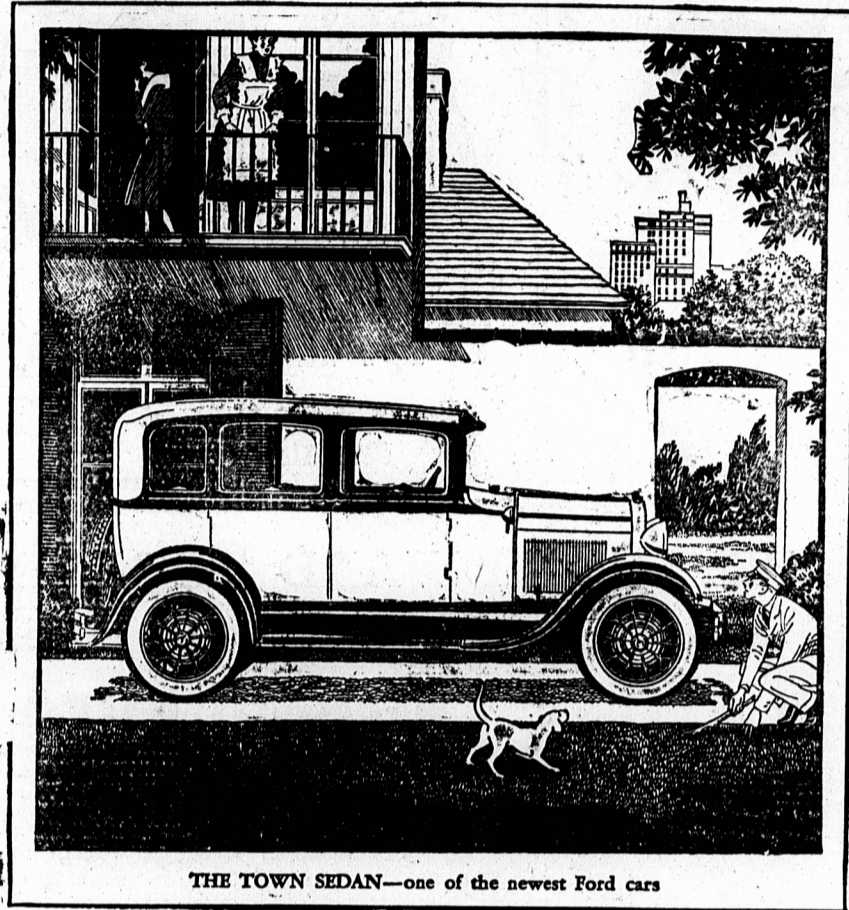
DIGNAN-CRASWELL

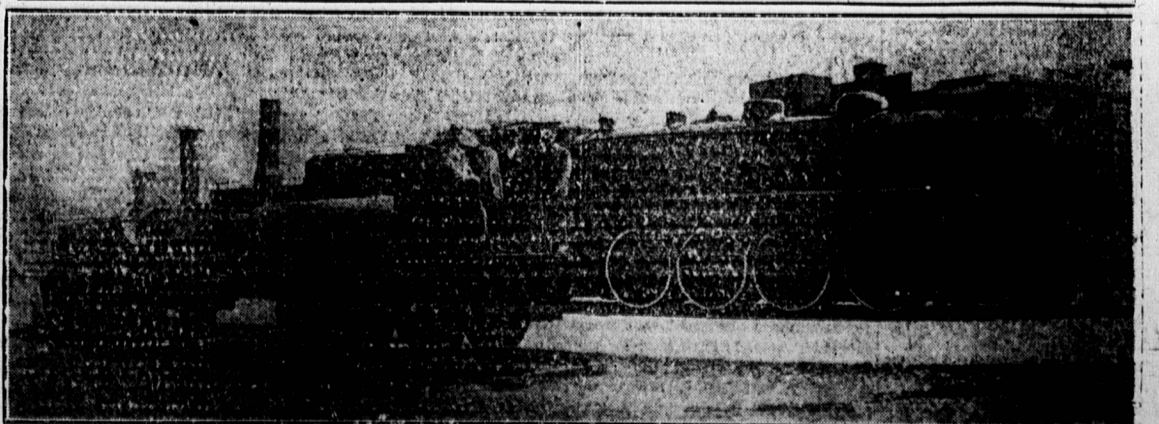
