P. P. MacDonald who also conducted services at the grave. The pall-bearers were Messrs. Windsor Arling, James McCabe, Joseph MacDonald, Thomas McCabe, John Tierney and Reginald McInnis. Interment took place in the Catholic cemetery.

RECORD SHIPMENT — The S. S. "Island Connector" and the S. S. "Meigle" arrived in port yesterday afternoon with the "Meigle" docking about 15 minutes earlier than the "Connector." Both cargo vessels will load farm produce for Newfoundland. The "Island Connector" will take the largest shipment of ready-to-ly pullets ever to leave the Province at one time. The shipment is consigned by Wheatley Brothers, Charlottetown, and consists of 5,000 four-months-old pullets.

COURT AT GEORGETOWN — Supreme Court opens in Georgetown today with Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell presiding. There is but one criminal case on the docket, that of the King versus Joseph Louis Mitchell, charged with rape.

POLICE PATROL BOAT — An R. C. M. P. patrol boat the "Vivian" docked at the Marine Wharf yesterday afternoon about 1:30 and is expected to be here for a few days. She came here from Picou, N. S. under the command of Captain Herman.

POLICE REPORT — One hundred and ten searches under the authority of the Prohibition Act were made within the City limits last month. Chief of Police A. Birwistle informed the City Council last night. Ten prosecutions for violations of the Prohibition Act within the City limits were made last month resulting in nine convictions. Prohibition fines amounting to \$1,165 were collected during the last month. There was also one Excise fine of \$100 collected. Those together with the collection of \$970.50 in miscellaneous fines and costs made a total collection of \$2,175.50.

CITY POLICE COURT—At the City Police Court yesterday two men charged with being drunk and incapable were each fined \$10 and costs or 20 days, while a third was sentenced on an old commitment. A drunk and disorderly was sentenced to 20 days in jail and a second was committed on a form of commitment. A man charged with speeding was fined \$10 and costs or 20 days. Five persons charged with assaulting and obstructing peace officers, were further remanded until July 16th.

REVISITS PROVINCE — Charlottetown has changed beyond recognition to Mr. J. Harry Hughes, retired C. P. R. superintendent and former resident of this city, who is visiting his brother Mr. G. A. Hughes, 148 Prince Street, after a long absence. In his youth Mr. Hughes was employed with Bremner Bros., and left here in 1886 to join the Canadian Pacific Railway at North Bay, Ont. He worked steadily up the ladder to the responsible position of superintendent of the Ottawa division, from which he retired about fifteen years ago.
