## OLD SEA CAPTAIN HAS PASSED AWAY

HALIFAX, Dec. 26.—Captain William Mara, one of the best known men in Halifax, died at his residence, 21 Starr street, yesterday afternoon. Mr. Mara first went to sea on the Royal Mail sailing vessel Sandwich, which conveyed the mails between St. John's and Halifax. Afterwards he sailed on the mail steamers Osprey and Merlin, of the Cunard line. He also sailed for William Stairs, Son and Morrow, William Fryor and W.B. Hamilton.

For a number of years, Captain Mara was a partner, with the late Peter Judge in the water boat business and they supplied nearly all the vessels that came to this port. He retired a few years ago and lived quietly at his home on Starr street. He is survived by his son, Thomas. The funeral will take place tomorrow at 2.30.

## MAGAZINE WRITER ARRESTED AT WORK CHARGED WITH MURDER

NEW YORK, Dec. 26.—Andrew McConnell, magazine writer and lecturer, was arrested at a reporter's desk in a morning newspaper office tonight while it is alleged he was writing a confession of shooting and seriously wounding his divorced wife, Mrs. Marion D. McConnell. Mrs. McConnell lies at her home in Orchard Grove, N. J., with a serious bullet wound in the head. The shooting is said to have occurred late Saturday night.

## MASSACRE OF PERSIANS BY RUSSIANS

LONDON, Dec. 26.—A massacre has been going on in Resht since Saturday, according to official Persian telegrams received in London today. These state that on Sunday five hundred Persians were killed by Russians, many of them being women and children. The people are said to have been exhorted not to fight and not to give the slightest provocation, but the massacre still continues.

## WAR ORDERS ISSUED BY THE RUSSIANS.

JULFA, Persia, Dec. 27.—Another large force of Russian troops left here for Tabriz. The reinforcements consisted of three Regiments of Rifles, three squadrons of Cossacks, and two mountain batteries, all at war orders.
