IN MEMORIAM

MR. JAS. R. STEWART.

On Monday morning, the 16th inst. Mr. Jas. R. Stewart, aged 71 years, of Union Vale, who was in apparent good health had returned to his house from a field where his son was working, but a short time, when he was stricken with paralysis and passed away the following day at noon. Mr. Stewart was one of the early settlers. It is now nearly 40 years since he came to Union Vale, then a young man full of courage and hope. He passed through the different stages of longer life and succeeded in making a beautiful home for his family. He was noted for being strictly honest, charitable and willing to work for the betterment of his fellow beings. An elder of the Presbyterian Church, and truly may it be said, "he did all in his power to promote the well being of the church at O'Leary, particularly in its early days." He was the first to organize a Sunday School in O'Leary, before a church was built, being at that time an elder of the church at West Point. The deceased leaves to mourn, besides a large number of friends and relatives, four daughters and one son. Mrs. A. Adams O'Leary, Mrs. B. J. Haywood, and Mrs. William Lovell of Vancouver, B. C., Mrs. Geo. Webb, O'Leary and Talmage at home. The funeral service was conducted by the Revs. Mr. Murray and Mr. Peacock, and was very largely attended. His remains were laid to rest in Bloomfield cemetery beside those of his wife and daughter.
