—PRISONERS' AID — The Prisoners' Aid Society is the name of an organization recently started in Charlottetown, the object being to give prisoners in our jails some useful occupation to engage their minds and possibly to assist them both mentally and morally. The idea has been working for the past three weeks in the Queen's County jail where the men have been given work repairing broken toys for poor children at Christmas, and where shoes could be repaired for the use of people in poor circumstances. An effort is being made to start a library for the prisoners and a home for homeless released prisoners. Last Monday members of the Ministerial Association of Charlottetown met and decided to provide monthly services at the jail, as well as at Falconwood, the Infirmary, the Sanatorium and the Protestant Orphanages. It is now proposed to extend the work to the Prince County jail and have a toy-repairing shop in the jail and possibly a shoe-repairing shop, besides a library if the citizens will but co-operate. Miss Laura Hughes, a daughter of the late Hon. George Hughes, of Charlottetown, is in Summerside and much interested in promoting these projects. —(Island Farmer.)

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11—Great Britain continued among war debt defaulters today by formally notifying the United States Government that it was unable to meet a \$994,486,367 installment due Dec. 15.

France and Poland also have sent default notices, of 13 war debtors, who will owe a total of \$1,680,704,427 Dec. 15, only Finland has made known its intention to remit promptly.
