BATHING WAS IN BAD FORM.

In these days of a perfect craze for an almost daily outdoor plunge and swim it seems impossible to realize that in England this delightful and hygienic sport was once not only considered useless, but in bad form.

Thus in 1825 a dip in the Thames was contemptuously called a French trick of washing. The reason is easily explained. Henrietta Maria, the beautiful consort of Charles I., full of the life and mirth of sweet sixteen, used to indulge with the Duchess de Chevreuse and her attendants in bathing parties, which always included a swimming race across the Thames. However, these private and informal displays had soon to be abandoned on account of the scandal caused by the very novelty of the entertainment, although seen but by a few chance passersby.

Sea bathing did not, apparently, enjoy much more popularity, and no great efforts were made to promote this health-repairing pastime even up to about 100 years ago. A glimpse of its limited vogue and scanty comforts offered to bathers will be gathered from the following description, quoted from the memoirs of a young society lady of the period: "Bogor. I have had a nice dip. The machines are very convenient, with a curtain all around that nobody can see you. You are not put in as at Brighton. Only one woman gives you a hand, and in you jump. Aunt and I went in two machines, but close together."

Thirty Records Broken.

At Philadelphia on Saturday Johnny Nelson of Chicago, defeated Archie McEachern, of Canada, in a 30-mile-motor-paced bicycle race at the Woodside Park track. Nelson broke every record from 1 to 30 miles, with the exception of those for 1, 2 and 25 miles.

Much of the interest of the race was lost owing to an accident to McEachern's wheel, which precluded any possibility of his winning. The saddle of the bicycle broke in the last lap of the second mile. In securing a new wheel, he lost 1 1/2 laps, and was able to recover only half a lap.

Crop Outlook in Moose Jaw.

Winnipeg, Aug. 14.—A bountiful harvest for Moose Jaw district is assured. Cutting commenced on July 22, as previously intimated, and is now general throughout the district, but somewhat delayed last week by heavy rain, which will be of some benefit to very late crops. From 25 to 35 bushels per acre is expected on summer fallow and new land, but stubble will not be so heavy.

Caught His Own Grandson.

BRIDGTON, N. J., Aug. 14.—Isaac Mulford resolved to catch the thief that had been visiting his chicken coop for some time, so he set a trap.

Mulford's grandson, Arthur, failed to put in an appearance last night and could not be found. Early this morning Mulford went out to the barn and found his grandson in the trap. The young man was held a prisoner all night and was badly bruised and scratched.

He said he had occasion to enter the coop late in the afternoon and got caught. He shouted, but being inside the coop was not heard.
