Veteran's Third Period Goal Enables Canadiens To Jump Into Playoff Position

MONTREAL, Jan. 27.—Montreal Canadiens were back in a play-off berth in the National Hockey League's Canadian Section after a narrow 3-2 victory over Boston Bruins here last night, ready for a New York American drive to oust them from the coveted third position. Canadiens outspeed and outchecked the curdy Bruins before a crowd of about 8,000 cheering fans to hop out of a tie with Americans into sole possession of third place. The loss left Bruins still in second position in the United States Section, a single game behind the leading Chicago Black Hawks.

A third period goal by the veteran Aurel Joliat, in his 13th year with the team, gave the Canucks the victory. Joliat pounced on a rebound to lift the rubber into an open net and send the Canadiens into the lead after six minutes of the final session. One of the six first-period penalties led to a goal by each team. George Mantha was on the penalty bench for a tripping offense and Bruins had five men up in an effort to tally when rangy Pete Lepine broke clear and rifled home a hard drive that gave Tiny Thompson no chance.

Exactly 28 seconds later with Mantha still warming the bench in the penalty box, Marty Barry snapped up a double relay from Neil Stewart and Babe Siebert at the height of a concentrated Bruins drive to slam the puck past Wilf Cude into the corner. Neil Stewart snapped a short pass over to Charlie Sands, for Boston's second goal. The Bruins' drive later George Mantha drove a bullet drive from a few feet out that just caught the far corner. Scoreless Draw At Toronto
TORONTO, Jan. 27.—(C.P.)—The once-wide-open, brilliant Red Wings of Detroit, ready to match offensive power against any of them, has become a close-knit defensive unit on keeping the New York Rangers out of a playoff berth in the National Hockey League's American Section. The style paid the usual dividend here last night. A scoreless tie with Toronto to Maple Leafs was pretty obviously what the Red Wings started out to get and 12,000 fans sat through 70 minutes of drab exchanges while Jack Adams' team proved it could do it. There wasn't a goal in any period. A bout of fisticuffs in the second period involving Buzz Boll of the Leafs and Cooney Weiland, the serious centre of the Wings earned Boll a major penalty and Weiland a minor. Weiland's head was cut open when he fell. He returned for the third period after the wound had been stitched. Officials—Oble Cleghorn and A. G. Smith.

Rangers Tied With Detroit

NEW YORK, Jan. 27.—New York Rangers clinched the season's city title and tied Detroit for third place in the National Hockey League's American Division by a 2-2 tie with the Red Wings here last night. The deciding goal, however, was scored on a dead slow play early in the third period when Bill Cook got off a remarkable wing shot while he was sandwiched between McVeigh and Dutton. Lynn Patrick made it 3-1 soon afterward and after Normie Himes netted the second American counter, Cecil Dillon tallied while his team was short-handed. Desi Klein scored Americans' first goal and Butch Keeling tied it up for Rangers on a double pass from Bert Connolly and Mason. Officials: Goodman and Rodden.

WINGS DRAW WITH BRUINS
DETROIT, Jan. 27.—(A.P.)—After losing three games in as many stars against Boston this season, Detroit Red Wings played the Bruins to a 2-2 overtime tie here tonight in a National Hockey League match before 10,000 fans. Two goals by Dit Clapper gave the Boston club the tie, the Bruins forward counting in the first period on a pass from Barry and then scoring again in the third to even up the Wings had jumped into the lead. A rare score for Detroit shortly after Clapper had tallied his first goal and in the second period Weiland beat the veteran Thompson to give the Detroit club the lead which Clapper's second goal wiped out. Hawks Stave Off Eagles' Desperate Drive
CHICAGO, Jan. 27.—(A.P.)—After piling up a four-goal lead over St. Louis Eagles, Chicago Black Hawks just managed to stave off a hair-raising rally and escape with a 5-3 National Hockey League victory tonight before 9,000 spectators. Taking advantage of loose defence play, the Hawks had a 5-1 lead going into the last half of the final period. Then the Eagles turned loose a series of five-man rushes that produced two goals in one minute, and were still rushing at the finish. Tommy Cook and Art Wiebe scored for Chicago in the first period then Johnny Gottselig gave the Hawks another tally early in the second period, but Clifford Purpur, the Eagles' kid forward, cashed in for his team's first goal in the closing seconds of the period. The wide open Eagle attack permitted Paul Thompson and Billy Kendall to count in the third period. The Eagles kept at it, however, and Glen Brydeman and Mickey Blake beat goalie Iwona Chabot for the last two scores of the match.

2 New Forwards For Black Hawks

Announcement that Miller had come to terms with the professional club was made today by Manager Tommy Gorman. Maroons are known to have been after Miller for some time. They would have signed him yesterday to play in last night's game against Canadiens but he was suffering from a bad cold and Gorman said they agreed to wait until later. Miller is the third member of the stary Hawks to join the Maroons. At the beginning of the season Aubrey Webster and Sammy McMann joined the Maroons. The Maroon officials spotted the three when Moncton met McGill University here last spring in the Allan Cup playdowns and immediately placed them on their observation list.

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Axe Falls In Americans Camp

NEW YORK, Jan. 27.—The axe finally fell tonight in the camp of New York Americans, after threatening to do just that for some weeks. It was not possible to tell immediately, however, the necks it would strike, but they are to be three in number.
