But the crowning work in his career since the victory of Omdurman and the arrest of Marchand was the Sirdar's work toward establishing a college in Khartoum to serve at once as a memorial of the martyred General Gordon, and as a means of imparting to the young men of that country an education in the ways of peace and civilisation.

Only future ages can unfold the full meaning and effect of what has been, is being and will be wrought in our day, for liberty, for civilisation and Christianity as the result of Kitchener's victories and his "school."

Charles W. Miller of Chicago, who won the six days bicycle championship in New York a few days ago had really held the championship from last year. He now scores 22 miles above his last year's record, making 2,007 miles in the six days.
