REPORT OF TEACHERS' CONVENTION.—The annual convention of the teachers of Inspectorate No. 3 was held in the schoolroom at Hunter River on 2nd September. As the weather proved unfavorable only about half the teachers were in attendance. Mr. Stewart Inman acted as chairman in the absence of Mr. Bell. After remarks by the chairman, who dealt chiefly with the new scheme of conducting P. S. C. exams, the various committees appointed. Mr. Court, local inspector, then gave an interesting address. In the course of his remarks he pointed out the benefits derived from School Fair Work and enumerated the different ways of raising the necessary funds. He spoke of teachers' enthusiasm in their work, and the assignment of lessons. The pupil's preparation depends largely on the time spent by teacher on his assignment. After the inspector's remarks the meeting adjourned until the afternoon. The "Question Box" was an interesting item on the afternoon program. Many helpful hints were received and many problems dissolved through the discussion that followed. A short address was then given by Inspector Shaw on the value of silent reading. The officers for the current year were elected as follows: President, Victor Ling; vice-president, Frances Bradley; secretary, Mary Adams.

Campaign Gems

In the Strand Theatre, Hon. MacKenzie King said, "Taking one cent off a letter practically means a reduction of one third of the postal revenue of Canada." In point of truth it means nothing of the kind. This reduction is only made on the three cent stamps, of which the number sold amounts to about \$12,000,000 each year. One third of this, for the remaining nine months of the fiscal year, will amount to a total of \$3,000,000. Mr. King stretched this three millions into over ten millions of dollars for the last five years. We speak more directly, and call it a glaring falsehood.

Both Mr. Robb and his leader King are busily promising another reduction in taxes which only give the voters a false picture. Foolishly they think the voters are for sale—like Progressives—and that such bids as these will land the fish. Tax reductions have been the fixed policy of the Conservative party, and they have been fighting for such for the last five years. In this they met the stoutest opposition from the King government, who voted down every proposal for

lower taxation. Only at the last session, when they WERE COMPELLED TO DO SO by Conservatives and Progressives alike, did they grudgingly give in. And now they have the gall to boast of it.

This saving to the people in tax reductions, being the fixed policy of the Meighan government, they don't have to run around with their mouth full of promises. Increased trade with greater duty on imports means a larger revenue, and with larger revenues lower taxes must follow, as the day follows the rising sun. 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The same Mr. Forke became slightly sarcastic towards his western rival for leadership (Mr. Dunning), in relation to the Railway debt. They were making what they called a loan to the C. N. R. Board, which was simply borrowing money for a government guarantee, and instead of charging it up to debt, they were enlisting it as a NON ACTIVE ASSET. To which Mr. Forke sarcastically remarked, "I AM INCLINED TO BELIEVE THEY WILL BE NON ACTIVE FOR A VERY LONG TIME INDEED."

"Mr. Forke: I do not know what reduction the hon. member refers to."

"Mr. Gott: The last reduction, the reduction prior to this one."

"An hon. member: THAT STAGGERS HIM."

"Mr. Forke: It does not stagger me because I do not know what the reduction was."

"Mr. Gott: Compare the prices."

"Mr. Forke: How can I compare them when I do not know what the reduction was?"

"Mr. Forke: Look them up as other people do."

When Mr. Forke said that he was not a member who said it was fifty per cent, and the fifty rate won the day, it brings out this strong point, that while the Liberals claim that higher duties means higher prices to the consumer, or user, in the United States, with a duty twice as high as in Canada, their care are away below rates in price. This proves the Conservative contention, THAT PROTECTION ENABLES THE MANUFACTURER TO SELL HIS GOODS CHEAPER, BECAUSE IT INCREASES HIS PRODUCTION AND ENSURES HOME COMPETITION.

When you hear Liberals crowing over the abolition of the Receipt Tax, don't forget that this was not a Conservative tax, but a new Tax imposed by the King Government, away from the Conservatives, and moved it as one of their own obligations. In the case of the cheque taxes, they only modified the increased rates put on by themselves. In real fact they were tax increasers long before they tried to boost themselves as tax decrease.

DUNNING THE PREVARICATOR

Those who heard the Hon. Chas. Dunning in the Strand, will well remember how smoothly he could polish off an untruth, so that it would almost deceive the very elect. He was very smooth when he first appeared in the House of Commons, and abashed with an idea that he was smart Alec enough to get away with some of those stunts there. HE FOUND OUT HIS MISTAKE. It was Dr. Manion who called him to account, and gave him some salutary lessons on the penalties applied to open falsehood.

As Minister of Railways Mr. Dunning had made a speech, in his usual style of prevarication, during the West Middlesex bye-election

which was reported in the Toronto Globe. In this speech he had told his audience some of the things he said he had "boldly told Mr. Manion," amongst others, that, "you are licked now." The extraordinary part of this, as disclosed in the debate, was, THAT UP TO THAT TIME DR. MANION AND MR. DUNNING HAD NEVER SPOKEN TO EACH OTHER IN THEIR LIVES. Dunning had made his statement out of whole cloth.

When Mr. Dunning was Premier of Saskatchewan he passed a sweeping Free Trade resolution from which we take the following: "(1) An immediate and all round reduction of the customs tariff. (4) The placing upon the free list of all food stuffs, agricultural machinery, farm and household machinery, vehicles, fertilizers, COAL, lumber, cement, gasoline, etc., etc."

But when Mr. Dunning was ON OATH, before the Royal Grain Enquiry Commission, answering a question re reduction of coal freight, he said,—"I think that is a case where the Ontario people should take a dose of their own medicine.—THE WAY TO MAKE ONTARIO PEOPLE BURN ALBERTA COAL IS TO PUT A GOOD STEEP PROHIBITIVE DUTY ON AMERICAN COAL, and then let the Canadian National Railways charge the fair freight rate for hauling it to them. IT IS THE FIRST TIME IN HISTORY THAT THE EASTERN PEOPLE HAVE BEEN IN A POSITION TO TAKE A DOSE OF THEIR OWN MEDICINE, AND I THINK THEY SHOULD BE ALLOWED TO TAKE IT TO THE FULL."

When the ex-Minister of Railways was cornered up in this he tried to squirm out of it by saying he spoke "ironically."

"Some hon. Members: Under oath."

"YES; HE WAS UNDER OATH, and to escape the penalty for duplicity he was willing to sacrifice the sacredness of his solemn oath, and attempt to palm off his sworn evidence as IRONICAL."

The above is ONLY A REPETITION OF HIS SLURS AGAINST THE MARTIRES WHICH AT FIRST HE DENIED, BUT WHEN CORNERED UP BY THE CANADIAN PRESS, HE SOUGHT TO SMOOTH IT OVER IN A HALF HEARTED APOLOGY.
