PREMIER BORDEN, SOME PROBLEMS FOR

Mr Borden is confronted not merely with the task of at once constructing a new cabinet but with other urgent and difficult problems. He must of necessity meet the new Parliament within six weeks or two months in order that needed supplies shall be voted. That will be too soon for him to definitely formulate his policy in detail. But he must then, at least, outline it.

For instance, he inherits the naval policy of his predecessors in an incomplete condition—tenders called for but not yet accepted for the construction of building yards, docks and warships. With regard to these matters and the other works projected by the Laurier Government,—the Hudson Bay Railway, the vast terminal works at St. John, for instance—it would seem that he must decide upon a definite policy, whether to cancel or abridge, or continue what had been agreed to by his predecessors.

In any case the whole body of the estimates submitted by Mr Fielding and not voted already must be revised and recast before he can ask the House to vote even the most urgent supplies. This work can be but partly done at or before the short session in November, and must be amplified at the later and longer session of the coming winter and spring.

Later the entire question of Canadian transportation must be taken up and a definite policy adopted. The bargain with the Grand Trunk Pacific was not in accord with Mr Borden's views. How far can it now be modified or amended? He is committed to complete the Hudson Bay Railway and operate it by commission as a Government road—a matter of very doubtful public policy in view of the winter and summer ice in the Bay. He is also committed to give the prairie Provinces the crown lands within their borders, a plank which the Laurier Government adopted later. This must involve a readjustment in whole or in part of the subsidies to Provinces.

And then there is the question of surrendering practically the whole of the Canadian hinterland to Quebec, Ontario and Manitoba. Let us trust that this shall not be done without compensation to the Maritime Provinces. Perhaps we may trust a Maritime Province man as leader to see to that. The injustice to the far East in Sir Wilfrid Laurier's proposals must have been apparent to Mr Borden long ere this.

Such are a few of the many serious problems which will confront the new leader upon his advent to office. His method of solving them will afford a fair test of his ability and statesmanship, but we believe he will be found not unequal to the emergency.

THE NATIONALISTS.

It would seem that of fifteen to twenty of the twenty-seven members elected in Quebec in Opposition to Sir Wilfrid Laurier all but about ten if not more fall into the Nationalist group. These men are opposed to the naval policy of Sir Wilfrid Laurier and also to the later plan of Mr Borden to make a direct contribution to the British Government of the price of one or more Dreadnoughts. But the coming Premier and the Nationalists have common ground in agreeing that the people should have been consulted before the project of constructing a Canadian navy was adopted.

A Montreal despatch to the Halifax Herald intimates that Mr Borden, before incurring further expenditure on the navy, may take a plebiscite on the question of making a contribution to the British Admiralty. It is said that the Nationalists, while opposed as above stated, to either Sir Wilfrid's or Mr Borden's proposals, are willing to submit to the decision of a majority of the Canadian electorate and that hence a plebiscite may be resorted to. The problem must be met in some way, for if the Nationalist numbers are as strong as is reported, their open opposition on a straight party vote would leave Mr Borden but a narrow margin, large as his majority now is. The very bitter feeling of the Nationalists to Sir Wilfrid Laurier, indicates that they and the Conservative leader, will probably find some common ground on the navy question.

Hon Payson Smith, State Superintendent of Education in Maine, will attend the Provincial Teachers' Convention which opens in P. W. College Hall today. Mr Smith will arrive this evening and will address the Convention tomorrow morning on the Characteristics of a Good School. He will also address a public meeting in the evening. Mr Smith is an ardent educationalist and enjoys a wide reputation as an engaging public speaker.

Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux, whose defeat in Gaspé has just been announced, was before elected in Rouville, and will therefore have a seat in the House. Like Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Hon Dr Holand, he was a candidate in two constituencies. He was one of the ablest and most efficient of Sir Wilfrid's Quebec colleagues. Mr Lemieux was first elected to the House of Commons in 1896, and in 1900 and 1904 was re-elected by acclamation.

BEATTY IN WAX AT THE EDEN MUSEUM.

The so-called "Chamber of Horrors" at the Eden Museum of New York City, has attracted world-wide attention, and is intended to represent criminals and methods of punishment. The jury which convicted him was composed of religious men, and after they were locked in a loft in the Court House at the close of the trial, and before considering the evidence, their voices could be distinctly heard in the Court House, for divine guidance, Beatty has been sentenced to be executed in November, and doubtless an appeal will be taken. EMIBUX DEFEATED IN GASPE YESTERDAY.

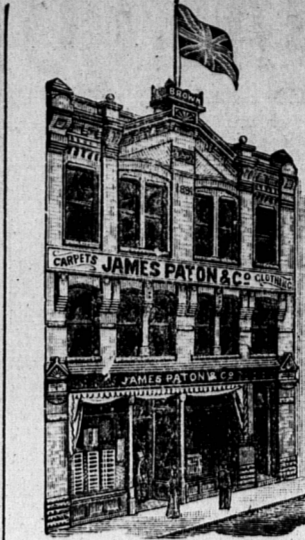
