## BRITAIN HAS MONOPOLY OF PANAMA LANDS

According to R. R. Marsh of Brockport, N. Y.—Concessions Include Development of Mineral Rights and Rubber Industry.

(Special to the Guardian.)  
WASHINGTON, June 4.—Charges that Panama has granted to British financial interests practically all the valuable public lands, have been filed with the Commerce Department, State Department and Congress by R. R. Marsh, of Brockport, N. Y.

Marsh, a scientist, interested in the white Indians on Panama, stated that unquestionably the purpose of the concessions was to give to the British exclusive control of practically all future developments of the mineral rights in Panama and to prevent the possibility of large American owned and controlled rubber development in Panama, sufficient in scope to make America independent of Britain's present monopoly of the world's crude rubber.

Commerce Department officials said so far as they know American interests had not contemplated development of the rubber industry in Panama. They refused to comment further, saying the matter was entirely up to the State Department.

## America Will Not Adopt "Brick For Brick Policy"

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 3.—Removal of duties on cattle from Canada as suggested by Hon. W. R. Borah, Dominion Minister of Agriculture in return for concessions made on the admission of American cattle to Canada will not be authorized by this government, it became officially known today.

Members of the House and Senate Tariff committees read with interest the suggestion of the Canadian minister but all agreed that no matter how meritorious the case might be, stock raises and packing interests Congress would not attempt to consider the idea at this session, which is expected to adjourn late this month or early in July.

## NEW MOVING PICTURE MACHINE PRESENTED TO FALCONWOOD

Institution Has Now a Projector on a par With Those Used in the Best Theatres—Gift of Citizens of Charlottetown Was Formally Presented By His Worship Mayor Miller.

The new moving picture machine has been secured for Falconwood Hospital through the efforts of Mr. C. J. Gallagher, manager of the Prince Edward Theatre, with the generous support of a number of public-minded citizens, was formally presented to the institution last evening, with His Worship the Mayor, members of the Government present.

The presentation was followed by a moving picture entertainment, the patients enjoyment of which showed the wisdom of securing for their pleasure a machine of this kind.

His Worship the Mayor Miller in making the presentation to the Superintendent of the Hospital, Dr. Goodwill, spoke as follows: Doctor V. L. Goodwill Superintendent, Falconwood Hospital.

In appreciation of your management of the Hospital, and the policy by which you have constantly endeavored to provide health giving entertainment to the patients and employees of Falconwood, a number of citizens have subscribed the necessary funds to procure an improved moving picture machine to replace the old one.

Tonight we have great pleasure in formally presenting this new outfit to the Hospital, feeling that in so doing we are making a worthy contribution to the humanitarian work you so successfully carry on in our midst, and if the future programmes continue to afford pleasure to the many inmates as in the past we shall feel amply repaid, but would express the hope that with better equipment a more regular and higher class of pictures will result, even if this should call for some expenditure by the government to supplement the voluntary contributions so freely rendered in the past.

Dr. Goodwill expressed his thanks and appreciation of the gift and said the following: Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan, in a following speaker, spoke of the beneficial influence moving picture entertainments had been found to have with the patients. Dr. MacMillan thanked the donors on behalf of the Provincial Government.

Mr. Gallagher, on behalf of all those who were concerned with the securing of the machine expressed the hope that the entertainment so provided would meet with favor, and he gave the staff of the hospital assurance that any assistance he would give in regard to the operating and maintenance of the projector he gladly would.

This machine, which may be looked on as a valuable acquisition to the equipment of the hospital, has ready been the usual theatre machine in the usual theatre for about a month. Dr. Goodwill, who has had considerable experience with smaller machines which have hitherto been used, will operate it personally. The projector itself is of standard type, but less delicate than the usual theatre machine, the film is not so liable to ignite. It was purchased for \$275 from the Coleman Electric Company by Mr. Gallagher, and it can be seen that he made a bargain when it is known that a new machine today would cost, bought in the ordinary way, considerable more than a thousand dollars. Mr. Gallagher secured it at this advantageous price when he informed the company that the machine was to be used for a public and benevolent purpose. The assembly hall of the Hospital has been specially equipped for the projection of the films, and wooden shutters have been placed on the windows to exclude the light.

It is understood that the Provincial Government will arrange for the securing of films during the fall and winter months, when this form of entertainment is in most demand by the patients.

The very commendable act of providing the institution with a larger and more up to date machine today was begun early this year when the machine then in use gave out, and Mr. C. J. Gallagher set on foot a move to replace it by public subscription. Since then the sum of \$294 has been collected and when the cost of expressage was defrayed this amount was just a few cents short of the whole subscribed amount.

No better indication of the patients appreciation of the gift can be given than the hearty vote of thanks they rendered the donors, at the conclusion of last night's picture entertainment.

## GEN. ASSEMBLY PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

Membership Now Over 150,000—Budget Calls for Expenditure of \$600,000—Most Encouraging Reports.

MONTREAL, June 4.—Over 200 Commissioners have registered for the first sederunt of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada on Thursday and over a hundred more were added during the day. The Assembly is being held in Knox-Crescent Church. Reports on Home and Foreign Missions, Missionary and Deaconess training were given.

Dr. Andrews S. Grant stated that there had been no failure to deliver the message of the gospel to all sections of the church.

"In ten years' time the Presbyterian Church in Canada will be back to pre-Union strength and the greatest period of that growth, will be west of the Great Lakes. Rev. W. G. Brown, Saskatoon, prophesied before the General Assembly here last night.

Our membership strength today is well over the 150,000 mark, and our budget for the year calls for an expenditure of \$600,000," says one section of the report of the general board of missions for 1925-26 presented to the general assembly of the Presbyterian church in Canada today.

"In five years time, from January 1, 1927, we believe our budget will be \$1,000,000 a year, nearly equal to what it was before the disunion."

H. N. McGillivray, chairman, advised S. Grant, secretary, in presenting the report that the records of the Home Missions and Women's Missionary Society were most encouraging and presented an optimistic outlook.

The report of foreign missions was of necessity of a very limited character, the speaker said, "but under the federal commission act and we know definitely what share of the foreign mission work ultimately will come under our care."

They add: "We feel that the need of the hour is for more volunteers for foreign work in the lists, physicians, nurses and teachers fully qualified and fully consecrated for their life work."

The report enumerates that over one hundred and fifty congregations have been settled since last assembly, the Presbyterian work in the reception of ministers have received forty into the church supply for congregations requiring it from Sunday to Sunday totalled 7,600, over one hundred and thirty students have been appointed to fields in a very large measure solved the problem of supply.

Rev. Malcolm Campbell, Montreal, recommended to the Assembly that Dr. Scott receive a retiring allowance of \$3,000 a year.

## REFRACTORY WITNESS BEFORE PROBE

## Bill to Strengthen U. S. Air Service Passes Senate

WASHINGTON, June 3.—The House bill designed to strengthen the army air service during the next five years was passed late today by the Senate without a recorded vote.

The bill would authorize an addition of 403 officers in the newly established air corps and increase the enlisted personnel from 8,400 to approximately 15,000 whenever Congress provides the necessary funds, and construction of 1,800 planes in the five year period and as many airships, free and captive balloons as the Secretary of War may determine to be necessary for training purposes.

## SITUATION IN EGYPT IS TENSE

British Battleship Despatched as a Precaution—Sirdar's Assassins Acquitted

(Special to the Guardian.)  
LONDON, June 3.—Great Britain has sent a note to the Egyptian government reserving complete liberty of action regarding the recent acquittal of six persons charged with assassinating Sir Lee Stack, British Sirdar of the Egyptian army in 1924. A warship is being sent from Malta to Alexandria as a precaution. A British battleship today was enroute to Egypt to cope with any situation which may arise there as a result of the acute political situation.

Sir Austen Chamberlain, Foreign secretary, today officially confirmed the report that a battleship had been despatched. When questioned regarding the Egyptian situation in the House of Commons Chamberlain would not comment on the situation beyond saying that the government still was communicating with Lord Lloyd, the British High Commissioner in Egypt.

## Zagloul Declines Premiership

LONDON, June 4.—The British government is frankly relieved over Zagloul's decision not to accept the Egyptian premiership. His selection of Adly Pasha as his successor is in line with the forecast in these cables early this week.

However the situation is improved it is still tense and the government is awaiting new developments on Zagloul's part before they can be sure whether the apparent surrender means a change of heart or merely a change of front.

## Sharp Discussion Over Hudson Bay Item

OTTAWA, June 4.—There were indications in the House today of sharp discussion over the vote of \$3,000,000 for the Hudson Bay Railway. The item was up shortly before the dinner adjournment but Sir Henry Drayton asked that it stand.
