EDITOR CHARGED FOR LIBELLING

Hon. Walter Scott—Stated that Scott had Offered Him a Large Bribe—Jury Finds Against Defendant and a Nominal Fine was Imposed.

St. JOHN, March 4.—(Special)—Wm. McLane, the editor of The Regina Standard, was on Saturday found guilty of criminally libelling Hon. Walter Scott by charging that Scott had attempted to

bribe him with an offer of \$112,000 stock in railway charter. A nominal fine of one hundred dollars was inflicted, the prosecution desiring conviction and not punishment.

MOUNTAIN PEAKS OF COLORADO

DENVER, March 2.—When it comes to the greatest average of heights there is no State to compare with Colorado. She can claim 47 peaks of an altitude of more than 10,000 feet, 93 of more than 11,000 feet, 230 of more than 12,000, 149 of more than 13,000 and 33 of more than 14,000. Her highest mountain is Massive, 14,421 feet, but Elbert is almost a tie, with 14,421. New Haven will be chagrined to learn that Mr. Gannett gives Harvard 14,375 feet and Yale 14,187. Princeton exceeds Yale by only nine feet. Famous Pike's Peak is twenty first on the list, with 14,108 feet.

LORD CURZON NOT SATISFIED

LONDON, March 2.—Lord Curzon of Kedleston, former Viceroy of India, has written a long letter to the Times expressing his strong disapproval of the decision of John Morley, secretary for India in the matter of the supremacy of military and civil authority in India. Lord Curzon contends that Mr. Morley only over-ruled the military party on a small and relatively unimportant issue and that Mr. Morley's solution is substantially the same as that of Mr. Broderick, the former secretary for India, in protesting against which Lord Curzon resigned and that it "creates a military autocracy and responsibility of the military element in India which may lead to fatal results."

MURDER ON INDIAN RESERVE

GRISWOLD, Man, Mar 2.—An unprovoked murder occurred when an Indian, Wondiski by name, was shot and instantly killed by neighboring Indian who bore name of Woolly Bear. The murder occurred on the Indian Reserve, north of here. Trouble arose between the two Indians over a horse deal. The murdered man had bought a team of horses from Woolly Bear, but was unable to pay for them, and this morning took the horses back to him, and the former owner was so mad about it that he picked up his revolver and shot Wondiski four times, killing him instantly. The community is in great excitement over the affair, as the murderer escaped, and is still at large, but Brandon Detectives arrived this afternoon to hunt up the culprit. The victim was one of the best farmers on the Reservation.

CANADIAN STAMPS AT BIG PRICES

NEW YORK, March 2.—The Times says: The two rarest postage stamps of Canada were sold last evening when the collection of Hiram E. Deats, formerly president of the Philatelic Association, was disposed of.

One of these was the twelve pence black adhesive stamp of Canada having a portrait of Queen Victoria, and issued in 1862. It sold for \$102 to John A. Klemann.

The other was the five cent Connel stamp of New Brunswick. This is one of the most interesting of stamps. Charles Connell was the postmaster general of New Brunswick in 1860 and on May 15 he issued this stamp which bears his own portrait, while the ten cent stamp and the seventeen cent stamp of the same issue had respectively the portrait of Queen Victoria and the Prince of Wales, now King Edward VII. On account of the five cent stamp being adorned with Connell's portrait, the governor disapproved of it and ordered it to be destroyed. A few of the Connell stamps escaped destruction. There were two specimens of this stamp in the sale. One was an unused mended copy with a few of the perforations cut close. It sold for \$55. The other was a cancelled copy in good condition. It fetched \$118.

CYCLONE, TORNADO AND VIOLENT STORM

In Different Parts of the World—Great Loss of Life and Property—A Series of Terrible Calamities Occuring Closely Together—Fleet of Fishing Vessels Feared to be Lost—Sad Disaster in Pacific Islands.

MERIDIAN, Missouri, Mar. 4.—(Special)—Nineteen persons are known to have been killed, and twenty-four injured by a tornado which swept over here on Saturday causing a property loss of a million of dollars.

TRONDHEIM, Norway, Mar. 4.—(Special)—The fishing fleet consisting of three hundred boats were here caught in a terrific storm Friday. It is feared that the greater portion were wrecked with terrible loss of life.

most destructive cyclone ever experienced in the Society and Tuamotu Islands occurred on February 7th and 8th. In this city it is estimated that 75 buildings were destroyed. The property loss is two millions, and many lives were lost.

STATEMENT ON PREFERENCE

OTTAWA, Mar. 4.—(Special)—W. K. George, ex-President of the Canadian Manufacturers Association who was the guest of the Canadian Club on Saturday at luncheon, said there was a perfect mutual understanding between Canadian and British manufacturers in regard to mutual preference.

During his trip to Britain he made it clear that Canadians desired to carry out their own industrial developments to the fullest extent and British manufacturers made no objection. Mr. George went on to explain that Canada must bear her own share of the burden which is fully chargeable to Canada.

Some time ago 'My Lords' came to the conclusion that its retention was undesirable, and it was accordingly done away with. Now, however, the authorities at Whitehall have changed their minds, and the naval boatswain is a happy man again. Pipes are being issued to all sea-going ships, and instruction in the art of sounding them to be systematically given to selected petty-officers and boys of the fleet.—Westminster Gazette.

NOVA SCOTIA BARK'T BURNED

HALIFAX, March 2.—The Nova Scotia barkentine Baldwin, Captain Wetmore has been destroyed by fire together with her cargo, at St. Vincent, C. V. Both the vessel and the cargo are a total loss. The crew were saved. The firm of H. & N. B. Lewis of Yarmouth received the above information in a cable from St. Vincent on Tuesday afternoon.

The Baldwin sailed from Philadelphia on December 17th last for Las Palmas and arrived at St. Vincent, C. V. on February 15th. She hailed from Yarmouth and was owned by a joint stock company at Yarmouth. She was built at Meteghan in 1890 and was 544 tons.

COAL AREAS CHANGE HANDS

GLACE BAY, March 2.—It is currently reported here today that the Cape Breton Coal, Iron and Railway Company now developing their mine at Broughton have acquired the areas owned by the Cumberland Coal Company which compose a block of about twenty square miles, and approaches within a very short distance of the Marconi towers. The price named is \$250,000, and the seams underlying the property are very valuable. Mr. Herbert Gladstone and Mr. Horace Mayhew, the leading directors are expected at Broughton tomorrow. Large sums will be spent in developing the Broughton property and the others named.
