COMPARISONS WITH PREVIOUS VOTES.

Three times the people of Prince County have voted in regard to the Canada Temperance Act. The first time was in 1878 just after the Act had been passed at Ottawa. The temperance people wanted to try the new law and petitioned to have it brought before the electors. When the vote was taken it stood as follows:

1877—For the Act	1702
Against the Act	271

Majority 1431
Time passed on and after six years the opponents of the Act petitioned to have another vote taken with a view to its repeal. A good deal of interest was excited and a much larger vote was polled than at the previous election under the Act. The result was:

1884—For the Act	2,030
Against the Act	1,065

Majority 1,965

The vote just now taken was under very different conditions from those of the elections of 1878 and 1884. The temperance people, or notably the advanced prohibitionists, were seeking to repeal the Canada Temperance Act in order that the Prohibitory Law might come into effect in its stead. The issue was a choice between two laws, one stronger and more advanced than the other, but both of which were designed to abolish the liquor traffic. There was here fair ground for a difference of opinion between temperance men as well as others.

The Canada Temperance Act was subject to approval or rejection by the people at intervals of three years. The Prohibitory Law now brought into force is not subject to repeal except by the Legislature. There are also heavier penalties and more stringent provisions in many ways. Men could claim that in voting "for the Act" they were not voting for license, but were voting for a law

which had been brought in by the temperance people and long supported by them. The liquor interests very naturally preferred the less stringent to the more stringent law.

It is possible that the new phases of the question presented at the election may have confused the minds of some electors, but it is safe to say that the liquor interest polled its full strength for the Act and was reinforced by some moderate prohibitionists who from preference or other reasons decided to stand by the old law to which they had so long given their support. The vote "against the Act" clearly represents the advanced prohibitionists of the county. In this view of the case the result becomes doubly cheering to the friends of Prohibition.

In the election of 1878 but 2,033 electors voted, while in 1884 the number increased to 4,001. The present vote is much larger, 4,721 with one poll still to be heard from. The majority is a very large and decisive one in any case, and when viewed as expressing a choice in favor of a stringent Prohibitory Law, as against a less stringent and permissive measure, affords the best possible proof of the strength of prohibition sentiment in Prince County. The following are the figures with one poll, Miminigish, to be heard from:

1906—Against the Act	3064
For the Act	1657

Prohibition majority 1407

Over three thousand men went to the polls in Prince County on Thursday last and voted to repeal the Scott Act in order that the stronger and more efficient Prohibitory Law might take its place. These men voted on purely public grounds without money or hope of monetary reward, without pay for the day, without the inducement of party favor, with no expectation of securing office or contract. They voted on the dictates of conscience, for the good of their homes and their country. It was a sublime spectacle.

MAKING FOR HOME RULE.

Sir Campbell Bannerman has very explicitly denied that any compact exists between him and the Irish leaders requiring him to introduce a Home Rule bill. At the same time it is neither impossible nor altogether improbable that he may do so before the present Parliamentary term shall end. Should he do so it will hardly be open either to Mr. Balfour or Mr. Chamberlain to charge that the matter had not been considered by the people: "Which will you have?" said Mr. Balfour, the former Premier, in Queen's Hall, London. "Will you have Home rule on the one side, or fiscal reform on the other. Put in its simplest terms that is the issue now before the country."

"The negative side of our policy," said Mr. Chamberlain, "is resistance to Home Rule; the positive side is our policy of fiscal reform."

The Unionist leaders thus during the campaign asserted that Home Rule was an issue before the electors. It is now clear that the nation has decided against the Chamberlain fiscal policy, of which fact there can be no doubt, it might also be argued from the utterance above quoted that a popular mandate has been given in favor of Home Rule. This would however be claiming rather too much. Both parties were agreed that the tariff question was in issue, but both were not agreed that the Irish question was in issue. The Liberal leaders claimed that it was not. But the Home Rule cause seems to be growing in favor, having won the support of a body of Irish landlords who were awhile ago its strongest opponents. It has a wonderful vitality. Twenty years ago the Conservatives declared it settled and ten years ago they claimed it was finally disposed of. But evidently the final disposition of this question has not yet been reached. In the meantime almost all the English-speaking world outside of the United Kingdom is squarely committed to local self-government and the federal system.

The winter has not been dead though it has slept. We may expect the mercury to talk with zero before February is out.

Fourteen hundred is a good majority. Most members of Parliament or of the Legislature would be well satisfied with one fourth that number.

The Y. M. C. A. will have a mortgage to burn some of these days. It is a laudable ambition. That worthy institution is doing a noble work and is also growing in popular favor.

Now for the vote in King's and Queen's Counties. Charlottetown is already provided for and when the vote to repeal the Scott Act in Queen's County is hereafter taken the City will not vote. The City repealed the Scott Act some years ago. No time should be lost in getting ready the petition for Queen's County.

February second in the Old Country marks the middle of winter. It has passed into a proverb that "Candlemas Day takes half the corn and half the hay." The rule does not apply in Prince Edward Island. There is usually more than half the winter to come in this latitude at the date named. This is very likely to prove especially true this year where the early part of the season has been so exceptionally mild.

Ex-Premier Balfour has been allotted an entirely safe seat in the city of London. The city of London, represented by two members is merely the inner city itself, which has less than 30,000 voters—is the very citadel of Conservative strength. There, election after election two Conservative candidates are returned unopposed, and it is a question if, even in a year of political land slides of the Liberal party, any other outcome could be anticipated by a contest in the London constituency than the success of the Conservative.

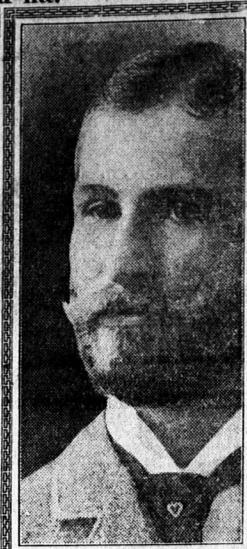
