All of the leading drivers with the exception of Murphy and Dickerson are finding the 1925 grade rather steep. The most of them are helping to fill in the summer while new men are awarded the honors and the big end of the purse.

In June McDonald started off with a rush by winning at Findlay with Great Belle. The clip made it look as if the day of Peter the Great would be one of the stars of the year. It proved her last flash in front. All of the other members of the McDonald stable except Winnie O'Wynn and Bob Seymour have failed to win during the first loop of the Grand Circuit. Winnie O'Wynn won at Cleveland and Toledo and Bob Seymour landed the three year old pace at Kalamazoo and Cleveland. The man who made turf history with Miss Jennings, Winter, and Miss Mac, Miss Harriette M. Jeanette Rankin and a number of other high class performers is shy of racing speed this year.

Valentine is having a very bad year. He needs another independent race to put him back on the racing map. Valentine won a race at the first Cleveland meeting with Buddy Mac and a dash at Aurora with Top of the Morning. The balance of his racing has been done among the placid tracks or with the bunch which also started. A few thought Valentine lost a stake horse when Murphy purchased Dr. Strongworthy. What the gray gelding would have done if he had remained in Ohio is only a guess. The returns also show that he had not proved a very reliable racing tool for his present trainer. Fred Edman dropped into Cleveland with a carload from Memphis. To date Favonina has been his only winner. It is shown that he will take all that he can win to carry the balance of the outfit. When this horse passes it looks as if his trainer would go with him.

At the beginning of the season Palm had a barn full of fast pacers at Indianapolis. Some of them looked like ready money. All of them failed when tried, the lot including Braden Ruler, John S. M. C. B. and Peter Mann. A fortunate purchase of Norman Gratian at the first Cleveland meeting and a transfer of Theodore Guy to his stable is all that kept the tall corn-shucker out of the non-winning column on the mile tracks. Before the circuit opened Palm won a race at Bucyrus with Laura Forbes. He won four races with Norman Gratian before Miss Czar Moko bowled him over at Cleveland, one with Theodore Guy and one with South Bend. The latter was a member of Chet Kelly's stable. Kelly was sick at Cleveland and Palm helped him out.

Of the eastern trainers making the trip over the mile tracks, few have found the going rougher than Crawford and Cox. Before shipping to Cleveland Crawford started at three of the Bay State Circuit meetings. He won with Miss Merle L. at Norwich and Miss Etta at Avon. Since he appeared on the track he has won at Aurora with Phil O'Neil, at Cleveland with Miss Czar Moko and at Cranwood with Kazoff. The tide should turn in his favor on the trip to Atlanta.

Since the Grand Circuit opened Cox has been constantly tapping at the top of the summaries without getting the decision. At the first Cleveland meeting he was placed in nine races with Hollyrude Jessie, Ethelinda, Margaret Dillon, Thompson Dillon and Star Ruth. Skeeter W. was his only winner.

Sam Williams won the Matron Stake for him at Toledo where Fred Egan also found a winner in the stable when he was given a mount behind Thompson Dillon. Cox won at Kalamazoo with Margaret Dillon.

The returns for the dash races at Aurora show that Cox won three with Ethelinda, two with Skeeter W. and one with Ethelinda. The two weeks meeting at Cleveland in August produced but one winner for the Goshen outfit although it had starters almost every day and a three year old that was beaten a neck in 2:03 1/2. All of them seemed to get the worst of the breaks.

Is the old guard passing out or only waiting for its second wind? The same state of affairs has also been seen in the Bay State and Orange County Circuits. When the season opened Harry Brustle had as good a stable as anyone in New England. Now that the toll has been taken his score shows two heats with Tuppie Volo, one with Purple Volo and one with Judge Leyburn. The barn full which Rodney had at Springfield last June contained but two winners, Jenny H. and Pirella Scott.

The balance are on the waiting list. Less than the former array which he had at Monroe early in the season won with Colonel Bidwell and The Great Volo which was sent to him from Goshen. He did not have anything like Worthy Todd this year.

TORONTO, Sept. 18.—The Toronto Telegram today published the following special despatch from Hamilton. "The Hamilton professional Hockey Club of the National Hockey League was sold bag and baggage to New York interests this morning. The reported price of the sale was given out at \$75,000. The deal was completed this morning by Tom Duggan and Tom Gorman. The sale means the passing of professional hockey here and the starting of the money game in New York. The deal as put through affects all the players that are under contract with the Hamilton Tigers. It means the shifting of the entire club from Hamilton to New York."

Springhill Ready For Game Saturday

SPRINGHILL, Sept. 18.—Springhill players and fans are ready for the final game with Westville for the Nova Scotia amateur baseball title and The Morning Chronicle Trophy at Truro Saturday afternoon. Nearly one thousand local fans will leave Saturday morning on a special train for the Hub while the players are scheduled to leave Friday night. Fred Hawker, fine fielder and heavy batter, who has been in the sick list, will be in the line-up Saturday. Lefty Allison is Manager Conway's selection for the pitching duties. He will probably be opposed by Williams, former Springhill pitcher.

County Circuit brought out the most speed ever seen on the half-mile tracks for a series of meetings. At Endicott trotters averaged 2:10 1/2 and the pacers 2:07 1/2. The average for the meeting was 2:11. The trotters averaged 2:12 1/2 for nineteen heats and the pacers 2:08 1/2 for ten. At Goshen the rate dropped to 2:09 1/2 for twenty-nine heats. The trotters averaged a shade over 2:10 and the pacers 2:08 1/2. The average at Middletown was 2:09 1/2 for twenty-eight heats. The trotters averaged 2:11 and the pacers 2:08. The average time for the one hundred and sixteen heats raced in the circuit was a shade over 2:10.

Dickerson won twelve of the forty races in the Orange County Circuit with Anna Bradford's Girl, Peter Malby, Guy Ozark and Guy Trogan. These moved him up to fourth place in the list of winning drivers. Pitman is third with sixteen, Vic Fleming second with thirty-five and Murphy first with thirty-five. Childs is fifth with fourteen, while Egan and Morrison are tied for sixth place with thirteen.

Six new winners were credited to Peter the Great last week. He has had twenty-five wins this year. Edwin has had twenty-three, Dewah seventeen, Dillon Axworthy and San Francisco each fifteen, Peter Volo fourteen, Walter Direct thirteen, The Exponent twelve, and Guy Axworthy eleven. The last one credited to him being Alleen Guy, winner of the Champion Stallion Stake for three year olds at Cleveland in 2:03 1/2.
