CANADA AND NEWFOUNDLAND.

The Montreal Herald's Newfoundland correspondence discusses the question of union between the Ancient Colony and Canada. The subject is nearly forty years old, and has been for some years relegated to the back-ground. It has always been a question of financial terms. The Island has always demanded more than the Dominion was prepared to give. And yet we think it would have been better for both had the comparatively small difference in financial matters been got over. Newfoundland would have escaped the necessity of parting with her most valuable public properties and franchises to Mr. Reid. Canada would ere thus have secured a great outlet for her trade, and would have increased her importance and prestige by the added population and the extension of her territory toward the mid-Atlantic. As it is our exports to Newfoundland are less than they were nine or ten years ago, and our imports from the Island have diminished nearly one third, while Newfoundland is extending her commerce with the United States.

At present the Liberal party is in power in Newfoundland, led by Hon. Robert Bond, successor to Sir William Whiteway. The latter was openly in favor of union with Canada, and Premier Bond is also favorable to union but does not press his views upon the public. The Conservative opposition is led by Hon. A. B. Morine, who is an outspoken unionist. But if the leaders of parties are thus favorable there is a strong sentiment among the people against union with Canada. The Herald's correspondent says the commercial men, fish merchants, traders and the like are opposed to the union, and they have large control. The Catholic people generally, who control 14 seats out of the 36 in the Assembly are bitterly hostile in the main, "this feeling being a survival of the old Irish sentiment against union which they inherited from their forbears, and which is vulgarly known as selling the country." Yet there are a number of prominent public men of Catholic faith who favor the union, active among them being Bishop Howley, the Primate of St. John's. The Protestant constituencies are less hostile to union than are the Catholic ones, but are not by any means united in its favor.

Before the Reid contract, in 1895, the correspondent thinks the union might have been easily brought about, but the Bowell Government would not make terms which the Newfoundland Government could accept even in their then desperate financial straits. The bargain with Mr. Reid has postponed the date of union, but the feeling in its favor is thought to be slowly growing.

There is a difference between the way they do things here and in Great Britain. Over there the chief Liberal whip publicly admits that he expects his party to be beaten in the elections. Here both the leaders are sure of a coming victory.

Hon. Clifford Sifton and Mr. Nicholas Flood Davin are holding joint meetings in the prairie country and are having lots of fun. The electors, too, enjoy hearing both sides at the same meeting.
