LONDON TIMES CORRESPONDENT ON PEACE NEGOTIATIONS

It is Not in the Interest of England and Japan to Make a Premature Peace Without Guarantees for the Future—Japanese Secrecy.

New York, August 10.—Following are some observations appearing in the Times from the London Times correspondent's latest despatches from Portsmouth:—

"The Japanese have with their usual passion for organization, assigned to one of their number since reaching America the duty of talking for all. But that arrangement hardly applies to the conference, since the Japanese chiefs of this extraordinary mission take the most serious view of the obligation of silence.

"Before he left Tokio Baron Komura sent word to a distinguished journalist. 'You must not be disappointed, but you must not expect intelligence. From now on absolute secrecy will be observed.' That pledge or warning, or perhaps threat, has been vigorously observed. Here in Newcastle Baron Komura sees almost nobody and Mr. Takahira's reserve is scarcely less complete.

"The effect of all this, little as it is, can only be and is to strengthen the belief that the conference of peace is foredoomed to failure. I met nobody who is very confident, that a treaty will be made. If the Japanese do not talk, their friends do and they say the war ought to go on unless it is ended by the complete concession of all the Japanese demands.

"When I left England a fortnight ago the idea prevailed that English interests required peace. No, says a high authority

here, it is not for the interests of England and Japan to make a premature peace without guarantees for the future. English trade, so far from suffering, has never been so good as during the last 18 months. The banks have never made so much money. As for Japan, continues the same authority, she has lost men but gained in everything else; especially in financial credit, and she would be foolish indeed to yield any single essential point to Russia. Peace can only be profitable to her if peace crowns the efforts of the war. That she can afford to be moderate is certain. There is, however, in Japan a great party which clings to the traditions of chivalry, which considers that Japan ought to lift up her fallen foe, restore her self-esteem, and make a surrender easy for her. In very high quarters their ideas, whether quixotic or not, prevail.

It is clear on the other hand that the Russians here in Portsmouth are in no mood to surrender. Daily their opposition to an indemnity or territorial cession comes out stronger. So does their belief that they have embarked upon useless negotiations. What happened this morning, unimportant as it may seem, confirms this view. I give both views as expressed to me here today, one Russian and one Japanese. I add that this distrust of peace is in the air.

HEROES AMONG RUSSIANS IN BATTLE

Tokio, July 9.—An officer of the naval staff has made a statement in which he pays high tribute to some of the Russian officers participating in the battle of the Sea of Japan. His statement follows:

"There were several Russian officers whose conduct in the recent battle deserves to be held high as a model and example for all naval officers. Among them the most noteworthy was the conduct of Captain Rodionoff, commander of the Nakhimoff. His gallantry is as praiseworthy as that of Commander Hirose. During the first day of the battle the Nakhimoff was exposed to the fire of our main squadron and sustained serious damage. During the night she was made the object of severe torpedo attack and finally, completely disabled, drifted close to Tsushima. The vessel was sinking and Captain Rodionoff sent seventy of the crew to land at Tsushima, remaining aboard himself with his chief navigator. When the Japanese approached the sinking vessel they asked the captain to leave the vessel, but he refused. The Japanese boarded the vessel and endeavored to drag him into a boat, but he resisted. The ship was listing badly and threatened momentarily to plunge into the sea. The Japanese were forced to draw off and the captain went below to meet his death. Suddenly the ship went down and our men thought the gallant officer was drowned. But Providence willed otherwise. We found the captain and navigator floating in the water locked in each other's arms. They had embraced at what they thought was the moment of death and were partly unconscious when we rescued them."

There was a dramatic scene when the Monomach went down. The Sado Maru, which survived the remarkable experience with the Vladivostok squadron in which the Hitaichi Maru was sunk came upon some of the crew of the Monomach and rescued them. Among them was an engineer who died and the officers of the Sado Maru gave him a military funeral from the deck. Later the Sado picked up the Monomach and getting a line to her endeavored to tow her to Tsushima. The Monomach was leaking badly and the attempt to tow her was a failure. Suddenly there was a great explosion aboard the Monomach and she began to settle in the water. Seeing that she was going down, Captain Kamaya ordered the men of the Sado Maru to line the decks and calling the buglers directed them to sound taps. It was a pretty tribute to the ship and to the men who gave up their lives in her.

LONDON, Aug. 8.—H. N. Brailsford, a magazine writer and A. H. McCulloch, who were charged with conspiracy to obtain false passports to be used in Russia, were fined \$500 each today.

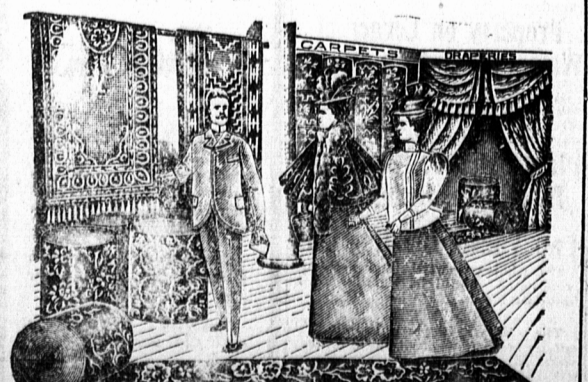

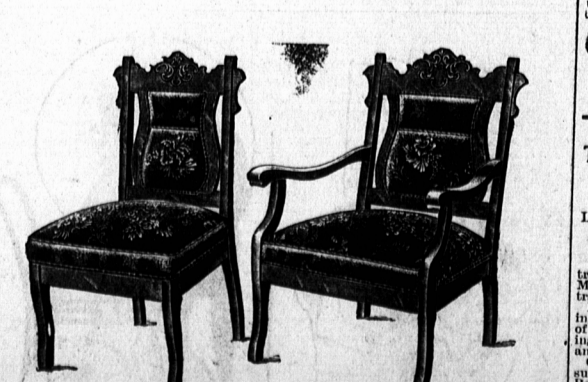
