ROAD MATERIALS IN P. E. I.

Brief reports have already appeared in the press of the investigations conducted by Federal authorities in Prince Edward Island during the season of 1927 with a view to finding suitable material for surfacing the main highways.

A brief inspection of the various types of rock available in the Province for road surfacing, writes Mr. Picher, showed that there was only one type, conglomerate, that could probably give satisfactory results.

The Federal Government has given no indication of any change in the ruinous tariff policy hitherto pursued and has lost the one member of its caucus in whom the country at large had most confidence.

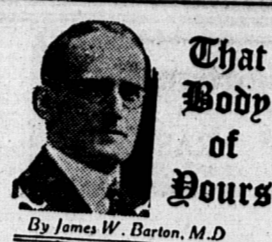

AN EXCLUSIVE MEAT DIET

You have perhaps been reading so much about the effects of too much meat in the diet—increased blood pressure, and bad effects upon the kidneys—that you have cut down on your meat intake.

This idea has become so firmly established that there is a danger that as a people we will not be eating sufficient meat for our needs. In the past too much meat was eaten.

Both men appeared ruddier at the end of the experiment than they had at the beginning. Stefansson lost five pounds which he considered excess weight, and Anderson lost six.

The dentist who watched both men reports that there was no change in the teeth; Stefansson had an increased amount of tartar on the teeth, and there was no pyorrhea in either of them.

Now does this mean that you should eat an exclusive meat diet? No. It does mean however that meat can be safely eaten, if properly chewed, and that it should take its place in the daily diet in the ratio 1 of meat to 2 of fat, and 3 to 4 of bread, vegetables and fruit.

Catholic Record On Prohibition

The following editorial from The Catholic Record, (London, Ont.) of Nov. 9, will be read with interest here:

"Temperance is a fine old word, denoting a natural virtue recognized even by pre-Christian pagan thinkers as one of the Cardinal Virtues—Prudence, Justice, Temperance, and Fortitude.

"Now as everyone knows there is a class of persons who would restrict the application of this fine old time-honored term to moderation in the use of alcoholic beverages—in use since the beginning of recorded history.

"But no, it is not moderation these people think of or talk of; it is the fanatical opposition to the use as well as the abuse of those beverages. Moreover they are fanatically determined to legislate all others into their way of thinking.

"Temperance" in this restricted and distorted sense is not Temperance at all; nor is it a virtue natural or supernatural; nor is it to be confused with voluntary total abstinence.

"The hideous farce that prohibition is in the neighboring Republic requires no demonstration to those with eyes to see and ears to hear.

"Mr. M. Alfred Michelson is a Congressman, a member of the Federal House of Representatives from Illinois. He has always posed as a fanatical "Dry," a bone-dry, to his dry constituents he was something of a saint and hero, fearless champion of the right as it is given to "Temperance" advocates to see the right.

"Some time ago—nearly a year ago—liquor was found in the trunks that were admitted in his name, passed by the Customs officers without examination.

"It is customary to extend the "courtesy of the port" to Congressmen when returning from abroad, that is to waive examination of their baggage.

"After one of the bottles had broken the liquor was discovered by other officers and a charge laid. Delay followed delay. Finally the Dry saint was acquitted, his brother-in-law, Walter Gramm of Chicago, coming forward and claiming ownership of the contraband beverages.

"A week or so ago (Oct. 22, 1929 Mr. Gramm was tried, convicted and fined \$1,000 for the offence. His lawyer asked for leniency, frankly urging as a reason that Gramm was merely the scapegoat in the affair.

"United States Judge A. Akerman in passing sentence made this startling comment:

"I have no desire to punish him for the faults of the escaped Congressman—one of those who vote dry and drink wet."

"Quite evidently this Federal Judge saw through the whole sorry evasion and had no hesitation in branding those concerned in it as hypocrites and perjurers.

"Many who sincerely believed that prohibition was a panacea for all intemperance have been convinced of their mistake by the application of the test: By their fruits ye shall know them.

"The die-hard prohibitionists, nevertheless, insisted on injecting the question into the recent election campaign in Ontario. To many it was the dominant issue of the campaign.

"Let us hope that the overwhelming decisive verdict of the people of Ontario will give this question its quietus as an election issue.

"Even if here and there die-hards survive in the rank and file who remain irreconcilable, politicians of average good sense will see that it is useless to bedevil Ontario politics with a legislative policy that is dead and damned."
