SURVIVOR OF STELLARTON DISASTER HERE—The many friends of Mr. Edward O'Reilly, Stellarton formerly of this city are pleased to see him in the City where he is visiting his brother Joseph O'Reilly of the P.E.I.R. Mr. O'Reilly is one of the officials of the Stellarton mine and was on duty the day of the fatal explosion. Though unhurt, he has some thrilling tales to tell regarding his experiences during the catastrophe.

ISLAND BOY WOUNDED—Mr. M. B. McKenzie, Glen Valley, has received word that his son Gr. Jack, (famously known as Murdock) of the No. 2 Canadian Siege Battery is wounded in the left hand not severely.

Prof. W. J. Reid of the Live stock branch of the Department of Agriculture leaves this morning for Denholm, Sask. on a short leave of absence from his department. Mr. Reid and Mr. J. E. McLarty have both had their eyes fixed on western lands and have decided, if prospects are promising to take up land in a partnership speculation near Dunholm. Mr. Reid will look over the land and Mr. McLarty expects to join him later, leaving here about May 1st. Neither Mr. Reid nor Mr. McLarty has resigned their positions here and their visit west will be, for the present at least, a holiday one.

A SUDDEN "SPILL"—While a car was being driven around the corner of Kent and Cumberland Streets last evening the body of the vehicle decided to part company with the shafts and front axle. All the driver had to do was to "obey that impulse", step out of the wagon and run down the street with the horse, the passengers remaining unhurt and sedate in the body of the wagon, which resembled very much the old time Japanese Jirikisha. After the passengers had alighted and the driver had returned from his short sprint the wagon was reunited and the equipment and passengers continued on the journey.

ISLAND PRISONER OF WAR—Pte. Hazen Chipman Baker son of Mr. J. London Baker of Alberton, recently reported prisoner of war at Limburg, Germany, has been adopted by the Active Service Chapter of the Daughters of the Empire, Alberton. This is the second prisoner adopted by this chapter. The Central Royalty Women's Patriotic Association was also adopted a prisoner, bringing the total number of Island adoptions up to 280. They are still 20 short of the desired 300. Funds are urgently needed for this very necessary work, of the men are not to die of starvation and neglect in prison.
