**PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE**

Continued from page one. people are entitled to enjoy. He moved the adjournment of the debate as it was now nearly six o'clock and there would probably be some discussion on the matter.

House adjourned till 8 o'clock.

**EVENING SESSION**

House resumed at 8.30 p. m. Mr. Irving continued his speech in support of Mr. Agnew's resolution with regard to the running of automobiles.

Mr. Prowse and Hon. Mr. Cummins followed briefly also in support.

Premier Hazzard said this was a burning question that had been agitating the minds of the people of this Province for some time. He was disposed to think the mover of the resolution had not gone far enough. He would say that the prohibition ought to apply to all the towns in the Province. He had communications from all over the Province and the objections made to the automobiles appeared to him to be insurmountable. The conditions were different in this Province to Ontario and Quebec, and even there the legislators were at their wits' ends to deal with the automobiles.

After much thought on the subject he could not see any way out of the difficulty except to bring in an act totally prohibiting the traffic of the automobiles. He thought such a measure would meet with general approval throughout the Province. It was a great hardship that women and young people should be shut out of the pleasure of driving; and it was also no doubt an injury to trade. He did not think it would keep any tourists away.

Mr. Morrison thought it was not necessary for him to say much. He had already spoken of the necessity of such legislation in commenting on the Governor's Speech. He had put forward then the arguments of the previous speakers. He was surprised that the resolution had not been introduced by a private member. The Government should have introduced the resolution. We were only talking now, what we should be doing is considering a law to prohibit the running of the autos.

Mr. Warburton agreed in the main with the previous speakers but he thought that if the machines became cheap in the future it would be a pity to have such a totally prohibitory law on the statute books.

Hon. J. M. Clark thought there would not have been such an agitation throughout the country if auto drivers had been as considerate as the drivers of autos were in Summerside. Speaking for Summerside he had no mandate to ask for the prohibition of the automobile.

Mr. McMillan (West River) spoke strongly against the act, he thought the representatives of the people of the country. He considered the legislature had a right to place prohibitory restrictions on the autos, which terrorized the people. He thought that in the country the prohibition of the act would be a great benefit to the people of the Province had been given a vote, and if they had votes they would show what they thought of automobiles.

Hon. Geo. E. Hughes, spoke in favor of the resolution, and moved an amendment that the prohibition extend to the cities, towns and villages of the Province.

Hon. Mr. Smith spoke of the general feeling in the country against automobiles and thought it only proper, while there were so few automobiles in the country, that the legislation should pass in order to meet the desires and convenience of the majority of the people.

Mr. McKinnon thought that the automobiles would become cheaper in time, but that if they were not totally prohibitory it would be hard to repeal it. He thought the act should be limited.

Mr. Macdonald thought it was not quite right to pass such a sweeping prohibitory law against the automobiles.

The resolution as amended was carried unanimously.

An act respecting the Indexes in the Office of the Registrar of Deeds for Prince County was read a second time.

The Act to amend an Act to incorporate R. T. Holman Limited, was read a third time and carried.

House adjourned till 10 a. m. on Wednesday.

**Synopsis of Canadian North-West**

**HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS**  
ANY even numbered section of Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section 10 acres, more or less.

Applications for entry must be made in person by the applicant at a Dominion Land Agency or Subagency for the district in which the land is situated. Entry by proxy may however, be made at an Agency on certain conditions by the father or mother, son, daughter brother or sister of any intending homesteader.

The homesteader is required to perform the homestead duties under one of the following plans:

- (1) At least six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.
- (2) A homesteader may, if it so desire, perform the required residence duties by living on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of his homestead. Joint ownership in land will not meet this requirement.
- (3) If the father or mother, if the father deceased of homesteader has permanent residence on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of the homestead, or upon a homestead entered for by him in the vicinity such homesteader may perform his own residence duties by living with the father or mother.
- (4) The term "vicinity" in the two preceding paragraphs is defined as meaning not more than nine miles in a direct line, exclusive of the width of road allowance crossed in the measurement.
- (5) A homesteader intending to perform his residence duties in accordance with the above while living with parents and on or farming land owned by himself must notify the Agent for the district of such intention.
- (6) Six months notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa, of attention to apply for patent.
