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Three - for - three Player Deal Between Chicubs And Giants Announced

NEW ORLEANS, Dec. 6.—(AP)—Manager Gabby Hartnett, in a move to rebuild the National League champion Chicago Cubs, swopped shortstop Billy Jurges, catcher Ken O'Dea and outfielder Frank Demaree today to New York Giants for hard-hitting outfielder Hank Lazeri, catcher Gus Mancuso and shortstop Dick Bartell.

The deal was completed with the Giants' Bill Terry here tonight on the eve of the 37th annual convention of the National Association of Professional Baseball Leagues, traditionally the scene of a flurry of winter trading. It followed a day of rumors which for the most part were denied as fast as they circulated.

St. Louis Browns, however, announced the trade on undisclosed terms of infielder Tom Carey to Boston Red Sox for pitcher Johnny Marcum.

Also in addition to their three-for-three players deal with the Cubs, the Giants announced that catcher (Bill) Cissel, veteran second baseman, had been sold to the Hollywood Club of the Pacific Coast League on a straight cash deal.

Throughout the day Terry had huddled with a number of delegates, giving a rise to the possibility the Giants formulating a working agreement with New Orleans of the Southern Association.

The rumor wheel also said Frankie Frisch, former St. Louis Cardinal manager, was slated either to take over management of New Orleans or join the Giants as coach.

Chicago Cubs outfielder Hank Lazeri, catcher Gus Mancuso and shortstop Dick Bartell.

No cash was involved in the deal which was consummated by Philip K. Wrigley, owner of the Cubs, and Horace H. Stoneham, President of the Giants, over the telephone. Wrigley was in Chicago and Stoneham in New York.

Other rumors drifting about linked the swap of outfielder Enos Slaughter of St. Louis Cardinals to the Chicago Cub outfielder.

Trojans Hand Notre Dame First Defeat

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 4.—Notre Dame came tumbling off football's highest peak Saturday, knocked down for the first time this year in the Rose Bowl game, a savage game that ended in a 13-0 victory for the Trojans before a record crowd of 101,000.

Beaten twice this year but determined to carry no more defeats into the Rose Bowl against Duke Jan. 2, the warriors of Troy upset Notre Dame's hopes in two lightning thrusts.

Each Howard Jones' eleven scored the first touchdown in the fading moments of the first half after the Irish had gambled for a first down in midfield and lost.

Trojans took the ball and Ollie Day, a reserve, trotted into backfield and two plays later, Day sailed a pass from the 37 yard line into the arms of Al Krueger who took it on the six and fell across the line with a Notre Dame tackler clutched in his ankles.

The Trojans' second break came with only 10 minutes left to go. Joe Piep of Notre Dame fumbled and Jimmy Jones came up with the ball for Troy on the Irish 35. Climaxing 10 Trojan plays from the Irish 35 yard line Anderson crashed across the Notre Dame line from the three yard stripe for the second... Trojan touchdown. Jones' conversion was successful this time, making the score 13-0.

Tennessee, unbeaten for the season, finished off their campaign by routing Mississippi 47-0. Jimmy Power of Temple added his name to the season's roll of fame as he took the kickoff from Florida and galloped 102 yards for a touchdown. Temple finally wound up victory 20-12.

North Carolina came from behind in the last half to defeat a fighting Citadel team, 14-6.

Brimsek Scores Second Straight Shutout As Bruins Take Hawks 2-0

BOSTON, Dec. 6.—(CP)—The first-place Boston Bruins widened their lead over the rest of the National Hockey League field tonight as they pushed over the shaky Chicago Black Hawks 2-0 in the only game of the night.

High Frank Brimsek, Boston's rookie goalie, it was his second shut-out in three nights over the Hawks.

A crowd of 12,000 gave Brimsek a mild greeting when he skated onto the Boston Garden ice for the first time in regular league action but, after watching the magnificent performance of Tiny Thompson's successor, the spectators gave him a mighty ovation at the final bell.

But they won handily in the six games since Oct. 28, drubbing Regina Roughriders 13-0 in the second playoff Oct. 29 and beating Calgary 12-7 and 13-2 in the two-game final.

The SNAPSHOT GUILD POINT OF VIEW



Low viewpoint, as here, gives a picture one aspect. High viewpoint produces a different picture. Try both.

MANY things go into the making of an artistic, appealing picture—and not the least important is the point of view.

In fact, the viewpoint determines the type of picture you get. Consider a picture of a person out of doors. Stand back thirty feet to take the picture, and you get a landscape view with a figure in the foreground. Stand only a few feet from the subject, and you get an informal portrait with the minimum of background. In other words, if you want to feature the person—get close to your subject. If it's the landscape you want—stand back.

Angle shots are unusual and attract attention. Shoot from an elevation, and you get a "bird's-eye" view of your subject. Shoot from below and you get a "worm's-eye" view. The resulting pictures of the same subject from the low and high viewpoints will be quite different and they will lend variety to your snapshot collection.

For example, the picture above was snapped from the beach below the diving board. If the snapshot had been perched aloft in the diving tower, with his camera pointed downward toward the pair
