EVERYTHING comes to those who wait. The Marconi tower it is said will be built at Pictou this week and completed ready for operation by next Monday. It takes a long time to send the messages as it did to raise the tower it will be a further cause of the growing discontent—but next Monday, or perhaps Tuesday, will fill the tale.

THE SS Stanley, after having been out in the straits since leaving Georgetown early on Tuesday morning with mails and passengers, succeeded in getting into Pictou yesterday morning at 4 o'clock. She left there on return to Georgetown at 9 o'clock. She was reported yesterday afternoon to be in heavy ice near Pictou Island. The Minto left Georgetown for Pictou yesterday morning, and she too found the ice hard to get through. At latest accounts last evening she was also in the jam near Pictou Island.

The boats which left Cape Traverse yesterday morning at 3 o'clock reached Cape Tormentine in three hours the crossing not being so hard as was expected, though the ice was rough and heavy. The arrival at the other side was signalled by the lighting a fire, in the absence of the lately deceased telegraph cable. Besides the mails the boats took over seven passengers among whom were Messrs McLaren, McLeod and Prowse, going to England, and Eugene H. McEachern on his way to Toronto. No boats left the other side yesterday for Cape Traverse but it is expected that the mail will arrive there today and the boats will bring it over.

ADVICES received from Scotland contain the particulars of a horrible accident which occurred to a nephew of John J. McLaren, of the firm of James Paton & Co, this City. The victim, a young man named Irvine, was a fireman on the Dundee and Arbroath Railway and was so unfortunate as to be caught in a collision. He was pinned beneath the engine which had been upset in the accident and for eight hours the portfire lay bleeding and suffering torture. He was relieved from his terrible position as soon as eager hands could effect his rescue, but the strain had been too much for him and he died shortly after being taken to the hospital. The collision occurred on the 23rd December last.

The Guardian has been requested to note the fact that Edmund Storie, the secretary of the Central Emigration Board, of London, has conferred with the premier and attorney-general of New Brunswick on the subject of immigration to that province. The Board is composed of men of high rank and position in Great Britain and has been formed to encourage and assist in promoting the emigration of desirable and suitable persons, who are assisted by public funds in England, from the United Kingdom to the British Colonies. The work will be conducted in strict accordance with the immigration laws, rules, and regulations in force in the several colonies and the board's machinery will be open to all classes of the community desiring to settle in the colonies. A most rigid investigation is made into the character and record of every applicant for emigration; a thorough medical examination is made and a certificate from the police must be furnished showing that nothing is known to the detriment of the intending emigrant. They are also inspected by a former Canadian immigration official, thus ensuring the best of emigrants only, and every emigrant sent out has a position to go to on arrival. The board is an administrative and advisory body, neither commercial, philanthropic, nor denominational in origin. It is national in purpose, and founded on lines of public utility and the welfare of the individual.
