"OFF ON A HOLIDAY.—Rev. Mr. and Mrs. Bell have been given a four week's leave of absence, and are spending their vacation at Cavendish. Their many friends here anticipated their return at the end of the period with Mr. Bell restored to his usual health and vigor, and enabled to continue the good work he has so successfully carried on since the beginning of his pastorate.

"THE LADY SYBIL, docked at the railway wharf, Souris, at 5 p.m. Thursday evening. She had a light inward cargo. Her outward cargo consisted of several carloads of way freight, shipped by merchants in Souris, Charlottetown and Miramichi, a quantity of lumber and several hundred cases of empty lobster cans. She left for the Magdalen Islands at 8 p.m. Her passenger list was small.

"SHIPPING NOTES—The schooner Sarah P. Ayer, which arrived from Pictou some two weeks ago and discharged a cargo of 106 tons of Inverness coal at Matthew & McLean's wharf, moved to the railway wharf last week, where she is undergoing some minor repairs. As she has not a charter to load in Souris, she will likely leave port at the earliest opportunity. Captain Smith is in command. The Coaster Beatrice, which arrived in port some time ago with a cargo of coal for Matthew & McLean Co. and which for the past week was loading cod-fish at their wharf, left Saturday morning for Halifax with a full cargo of 300 quintal of dried cod-fish, Capt. W. O. Harrow is in command. The Nellie J. King, left for Shelburne Friday morning with a cargo of 5000 bus. potatoes; 400 bus. turnips, 400 bus. oats, and 300 feet hemlock plank. She was loaded by Matthew & McLean Co. and is commanded by Captain Goodick. She arrived at Port some three weeks ago with 21 dorles the above firm. The schooner Uncle Sam is still at the railway wharf where she is being loaded by Thomas Kichham, Souris West. Her cargo, which consisted of 3000 bus. blue potatoes, 2000 bus. red potatoes and several quintals of dried cod-fish, is almost complete. She will leave port early this week for Halifax. Capt. Harpell is in command. The Eagle Sam, arrived from Halifax about ten days ago with a cargo of salt which she discharged at Matthew & McLean's wharf. The Lunenburg schooner Elsie M. Walters, owned and commanded by Capt. Walters was moored at the railway wharf last week, where she was taking supplies on board. The schooner has spent the last six months fishing, meeting with fair success. It is now their intention to return to Lunenburg. She has on board several quintal of hake, taken from these waters within the last six weeks. The Daisy Vaughan in command of Capt. DeCoste is still at the railway wharf where she is loading produce for J. J. Hughes & Co. She will sail as soon as her cargo is complete. The Mederio, Capt. Hartland which arrived in Ballast on 13 inst. was loading produce during the greater part of last week. Although chartered by Matthew & McLean Co. she is loading at the railway wharf as she is taking most of her cargo from cars. News has been received that the three master Lighthouse, which left this port ten days ago, made the run to St. Pierre, in the short space of 44 hours. This schooner is owned and loaded by J. J. Hughes & Co. and is commanded by Capt. Bushey. J. J. Hughes & Co., recently made several large shipments of cattle.

"FISHING.—A few fishermen at Red Point, and Basin Head are getting fair catches of hake on the fine days, which don't come often, while off South Lake good catches of cod-fish are made far off the shore by the motor boats during favorable weather. The regular fishermen have made a fairly good season's work, owing largely to the unusual and unexpected catch of immense mackerel made off the East Point during the month of October.
