TO IMPROVE QUEEN STREET.—The city has entered into a contract with the Carrite-Patterson Manufacturing Company of St. John for the laying of a tarvia surface on Lower Queen Street. The tarvia covered area will extend from the southern edge of Water Street to the Southern edge of Richmond Street. The work is to start immediately. This will be the first street in Charlottetown to be resurfaced with tarvia. It makes a solid, smooth and altogether very serviceable street. It is laid on a solid foundation of stones rolled smooth, with two inches of tarvia ingredient embedded over all and rolled smooth. The street will be properly graded at the same time and surface drainage pipes laid.

PRISONERS OF WAR.—Mrs. Rivers Buckley the Head of the Prisoners of War Department of the Red Cross in London, England, in a recent letter to Canon Simpson expresses renewed thanks for the generous contributions coming from Prince Edward Island. The cost of food has risen so rapidly in England that it now requires \$15.00 per month to supply each man with food and clothing. While the amount for an option is still \$4.50 as before, it is hoped that special donations will be made by those who are unable to adopt a prisoner to help out this charge on the society. Canon Simpson will supply collecting envelopes to any one who will canvass for contributions. The new adoptions this week are Fryon Methodist Sunday School, Hampshire Methodist Church (2) Khaki Chain Club, a few friends of the Prisoners; Miss Kate Milligan, Miss A. Clarke and others. Cape Traverse Red Cross. A donation from St. Margarets W. P. A. of \$25.05. One hundred and seventy prisoners now adopted in P. E. I. Can we make it 200 before Dominion Day?

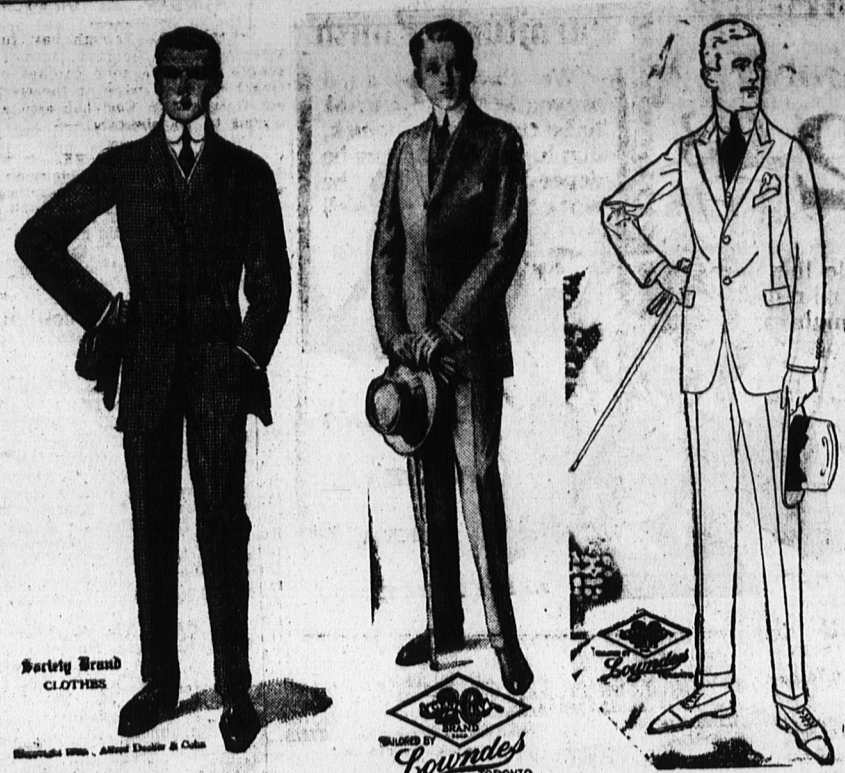
