The death is recorded of Frances Sophia, second and dearly beloved child of Mr. and Mrs. Charles McQuillan, 50 Maynard street, Halifax. She was in her fourth year, and was a very promising little girl—the idol of her parents, and the sunshine of the home. Her death occurred under very sad circumstances. Accompanied by her mother and her little brother and sister, she was spending the summer at the home of her relatives, Mr. and Mrs. Edward R. Laverly, Auburn, Prince Edward Island. Shortly after her arrival she became ill of apoplexy meningitis, and she passed away on the 25th inst., after two weeks, suffering, despite the best medical attendance, and the loving ministrations of gentle hands. Her grandmother Mrs. George McGuire, and her aunt, Mrs. Alan Druban, were hastily summoned and they reached her a few days previous to the end—a very sad privilege indeed. A particularly sad feature is that Mr. McQuillan is now at the front, having gone with the 25th Battalion during the early stages of the war. Her body was brought home on Saturday and interment made Monday afternoon in Mount Olivet cemetery.

Governor Macdonald has many friends here in the West, as well as relatives, among the latter being a "good" friend, John A. Atchick, director of the "House of the Ancients," Martinez, Cal."

SALT WATER FOR STREETS.—The Pictou Advocate says: An advocate of the use of salt water for laying the dust says that this talk about water injuring the varnish on killing two birds with one stone, that he worked in Ivery stable where salt water was used on the streets and that he never saw the varnish injured any. GAZETTED.—The Royal Gazette contains a proclamation ordering that the following roads be brought under the operation of the Automobile Act: "Beginning at the junction of the Black River Road and north end of the Union Road, extending thence Eastwardly along the Black River Road to the Boundary Road, thence Northwardly along the Boundary Road to its termination; also Eastwardly along the Church Road from its junction with the Boundary Road to the Covehead West Road, thence Northwardly along the Covehead West Road to its junction with the Boundary Road; also Southwardly along the Covehead West Road to the junction with the Gurney Road; also the road from the Covehead West Road running Eastwardly over Case's Bridge to the junction of the Covehead RR Road at Auld's Mills."
