St. John is a beautiful City and its thriving mercantile and manufacturing interests are well worth going to see.

The Exhibition here Friday was a grand success. The turnstiles registered 10,516 admissions. The crowd was very orderly. No drunkenness. Judging is about over and Island stock has done well.

For all time a monument has been known as that which perpetuates the memory of a person or an event, specifically a pillar, a shaft or any structure placed over a tomb or a grave. Anything not conspicuous or fine cannot be termed a monument. In Canada and more especially in the Maritime Provinces where monuments, over the graves are used it is fitting that anything erected shall contain the three following qualifications, viz: conspicuousness, impressiveness and permanence. Persons who call at Messrs. Cairns & McFadden's monumental works on Kent Street at the present time will be impressed with a beautiful red Swedish polished cottage monument. It is ten feet high with a 3 foot base.

The monument is surmounted with a massive cross. The structure is a work of art and no pen can describe its worth as a memorial when placed in the plot in a cemetery. But that is not all, workmen are at work lettering a beautiful polished granite which has been placed to mark the memory of one departed. Upon inquiry it was learned that besides the cottage monument there were scores of other gems worked in Nova Scotia granite, St. George's grey and red granite, Scottish granite, not to mention the beautiful cuttings in Brandon and Italian marble. It is but right that the resting place of those in silence from the living should be marked, so that those wandering through the avenues of the grave yard can take note of their departure and mark their last resting place.
